He Kicks the other Kicker.

Mr. Editor: I read in your last issue the article entitled "A kick from a kicker." Now, Mr. Editor, to be an intelligent kicker, one must investigate things and find proper cause. Then he is an intelligent kicker, and an educator, for he brings to the attention of the public matters that are wrong, and kicks to have them corrected. The foolish kicker is he who kicks without investigation, or because everything does not go his way, and makes a public nuisance of himself.

Kick No. 1 from the kicker: He wants to know the use of having a day policeman. But excuse me Mr. Economy, you asked some Councilman. I'm not a member of Council, and will not butt in.

Kick No. 2: He wants to know if there isn't some one in the town who will fill the position of Collector and Treasurer at the salary of \$500 a year. There is no question but what there are some people in town who would attempt to fill the position for half the above amount. As for myself, I do not know what the position is worth, as I have not investigated and don't know just how much work and responsibility there is to the position, but I do know that the present incumbent is very efficient, and the Town would have to look a long way before it would find an official superior to Mr. Davis. It is evident that Economy has not made the proper investigation as to the position named, or he would set forth specific reasons why the salary should not be raised.

Economy finds by the town report that there was an expenditure of one dollar for burying an animal, and he is fearful that perhaps the animal was a mouse. Quite a large kick! It is wonderful that the kicker did not strain himself badly in making that kick.

Economy does not want to be considered only a kicker, so approves Council's plan of having an expert to audit the Town's accounts. Be careful, Mr. Economy; expert auditors come high.

The Kicker also approves Council's rule of no smoking. I suppose he means in the Council Room. It is evident he is not a smoker.

Now, Mr. Economy, I will give you a pointer. Go to the Collector's office and spend a little time looking over the Assessors' duplicate; note down some of the assessments made for 1909, and go out and view the properties. You will find discriminations from one to four hundred per cent, on actual values. In other words, some tax-payers pay much more than they should, and others are paying less than their just proportion. The Assessors seem to have no rule or guide in making assessments; the poorer the person, or the less property he has to assess, the greater he is assessed in proportion.

Mr. Economy, if you will make the investigation suggested, and find facts as stated, and then make your kick, you will be making a just and intelligent kick, and be a benefactor to your fellow-townsmen.

When you have induced the Assessors to make a just assessment in our town, and if you are still in the mood for kicking, I will give you another subject, as I know of several good intelligent kicks that might be made.

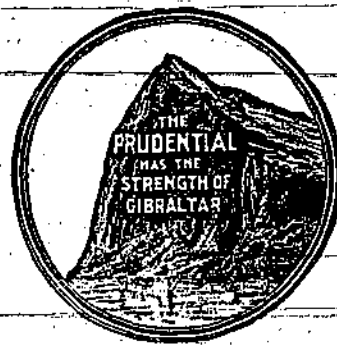

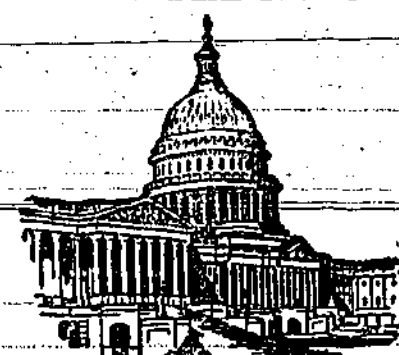

THE PULPIT.

A SCHOLARLY SUNDAY SERMON BY
THE REV. C. B. ETLER.

Theme: Seeking God's Kingdom.

Brooklyn, N. Y.—In the Church of the Good Tidings the pastor, the Rev. Charles Etlar, preached Sunday on "Seeking God's Kingdom."

He said: "In bygone years, when people went upon the theory that man is an inherently depraved and that his natural allegiance while on earth is to the sovereignty of the devil, in those days, when one talked about seeking God's Kingdom, it meant that a man should shut out the sunshine and enjoyment from his days; that he should crucify his nature upon the cross of self-denial and that through a sad and lonely earthly life he should look forward with patient longing for the kingdom that he must seek in some future world."

He who would seek God's Kingdom talks not of original sin; he publishes good tidings of ultimate perfection.

What does it mean for us, this seeking for God's Kingdom? We rise with the new day and look out brightly through the windows.
