
# An Interesting Letter.

Concluded from last week.) Next morning we struck the Bengent road proper, and in an hour of good going we were in the foot-hills. About 9 30 we asked the distance to "Twig Peak," und were told that it was "two and a half miles." For the next three hours we were told, every 'time, "two and a balf miles," and, in teo minutes atter the last man had told us, we ran, slam-bang loto camp. Say, maybe it wuen't beautiful, -right in the Bude Biver Canyon, mountaine on either side: a day's climb bigh, a river as clear as crystal. There is a swimming hole in a natural rock basin, about 20 yards in distinter, and two-feet from the edge in one place a sheer drop of 30 leet, the rest a solid wall of rock. Just down the river from there, are a set of boiling sul-

phur spriogs. Next day we had to cross eight swinging bridges, then camp in a zigzag to the creat of the range. At is about seven miles up, and when we finally hit the top we were only 500 yards torward from where we started. From there to Bagio was about seven miles more, of good enough roads, but quite steep. We made camp about 3 p. m. There is quite a nice military reservation there, and some very handcome




