Concerning "Gross Carelessness."

In last week's "Republican" an article contained the following: "There are a great many cases of sore throat in town, which can easily develop into diphtheria if not properly attended to. The cause of our trouble the past six months has been due to gross carelessness."

The question comes up, Who is responsible for this "gross carelessness"? Are cultures taken from suspicious throats, and patients isolated before damage is done? Are the quarantines strict enough after a culture is proven positive? In the laundry removed from an infected house without being carbolicized? Are all the rooms of the house fumigated with proper germ killers? Are quarantined inmates kept in a placarded house until each has had two negative cultures—a form recognized by the medical profession? or are they allowed to rush immediately out-of-doors as soon as the much-hated red sign has been removed, and generously disseminate the germs living in their throats?

If these questions can be conscientiously answered by the proper authorities, then the suffering public will admit "gross carelessness" elsewhere, and other means of preventing the spread of communicable diseases, of which diphtheria is now the most common, must be employed.

It will be seen from the report that there were 65 weddings in Hammonton, while only 60 licenses were issued, 4 having obtained their licenses elsewhere.

The increase in expense of the Board of Health of Hammonton is due to the epidemic of diphtheria which raged here during the summer and fall of 1916. Quarantine expenses for diphtheria and infantile paralysis are far in excess of any previous year.

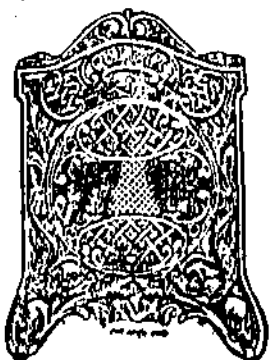

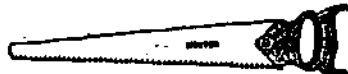

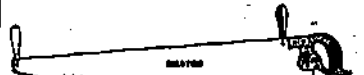
