What is now undertaken in New Jersey, where industrial and business depression is severe, creating unemployment, losses and distress on all sides, directly concerns every shipper and passenger, every larmer, trucker and industrial worker in the State, every family, every individual, being a measure to stop a perfectly unnecessary expense in railroad operation, as one important move to get down the whole cost of railroad operation and service for the benefit of all.

The railroads in New Jersey are sure the people of the State will ove this move to end an excess cost, therefore ask their active support and request them, both women and men, as citizens to urge their legislative representatives by letter, telegram, telephone or personal interview to vote for the bill soon to be on passage.
