The Civic Club.

One of the most interesting and instructive meetings held by the Civic Club was Tuesday afternoon, in the parlor over the Trust Company. Fifty four members were present, besides a number of guests. Through the efforts of Mesdames Whiffen and Meade, Miss Florence Sanville, Secretary of the Consumers' League of the State of Pennsylvania, gave a talk on "Child Labor," touching briefly the conditions in mills, factories and collieries. She spoke of the unsanitary conditions, the long and tedious hours, and the low wages paid to boys and girls ranging in age from eleven to sixteen years. Also of the grave necessity of the public discouraging any business that employs these children, and that we, as Americans, assist in this grand movement. She suggested that we purchase our necessities where the proprietors are also in sympathy with this work.

Mesdames Setley and Crowell served dainty refreshments.

Two members of the club will attend the Conference of the New Jersey State Charities and Correction, to be held in Camden, Feb. 13th to 15th.

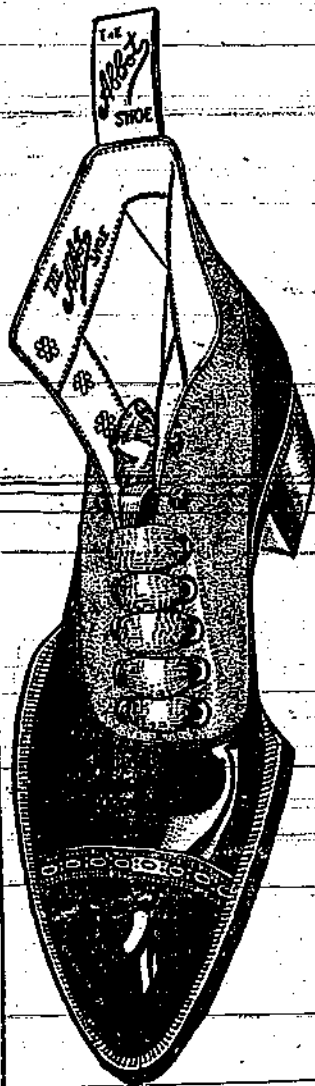
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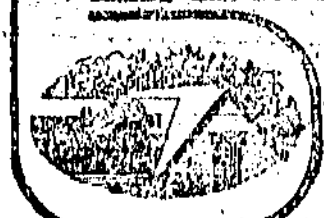
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
