THAT WATER REPORT.

EDITOR REPUBLICAN:

I desire to protest, as a citizen of Hammonton, against the misleading, imperfect and evasive report, made in behalf of the Water Commissioners by Mr. James L. White. The report is defective in the following particulars:

1. In the "General Cash Account," which purports to be a statement of cash receipts and cash payments, from the date of first payment on account of the water works, to Dec. 31, 1907. No distinction is made between the cost of construction and cost of operation. These separate classes of expenditures should evidently be separated, instead of being lumped under one item, \$71408.91.

2. In the account described as a "Summary of Operation" the sum of \$7654.31 is stated as the receipts from Oct. 1 1906 to Dec. 31, 1907. In this sum, two items are improperly included.

(a) \$1221.40—"Due on rents for previous Oct. 1 1906 to Dec. 31, 1907," which represents money earned prior to Oct. 1st, 1906, and already included in the income of previous years. To include these accounts receivable for Oct. 1, 1906, in the income of the fifteen months following that date, is manifestly improper.

(b) "Fire plugs, 72 at \$25 per year, \$2250." This is not cash received, but credit taken. It is no doubt an advantage to the town to have these plugs; our insurance is much lower on account of the water system; but this item is not a cash receipt, and should not be so counted.

According to the statement, \$7654.31 was paid out, or a liability for its payment was incurred, from Oct. 1, 1906 to Dec. 31, 1907, and \$4132.38 was received, leaving a deficit on the operations of this period of \$3521.93, which must be made up out of other receipts.

It is also noteworthy that in this statement, headed, "Summary of Operation," no itemized statement of operating expenses is presented. Some of this amount, \$2913.37 was spent for construction; and the failure to make this separation, makes the financial showing much worse than it should appear.

What the citizens of the Town, especially those who voted for Messrs. M. L. Jackson, Chas. A. Wood, and Thomas Skinner, together with the appropriation of \$200 for "Water Works Investigation" desires—is answered—detailed, full, and explicit, certified to by a disinterested public accountant, free from any suspicion of political affiliation—to the following questions:

1. The total amount actually expended on the construction of the water system, as evidenced by vouchers and receipts.

2. An itemized statement of the cost of operating the water system, including a certificate that the prices paid for material are the market prices, and that all the material purchased is applied to the purposes of the water works.

3. Intelligible operating and income accounts for the year ending Dec. 31, 1907.

For the Water Commissioners or Council to refuse to furnish this information will inevitably create an impression, perhaps erroneous, that the Water Commissioners are either afraid or unable to present an account of their stewardship, and that Council is protecting them in this attitude.

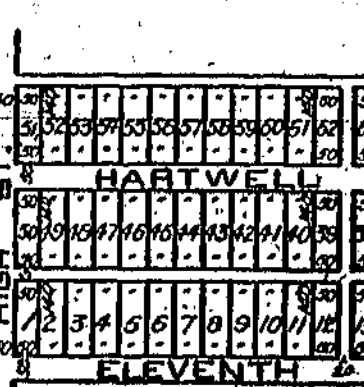
