I. Obeying the Law. There are ways in which the Law where the question is between neigh-The Law may be obeyed through fear, or on account of the punishment which would follow its violation. But only to fear. If a man is a clever scoundrel he may avoid detection, or, [ if detected, he may perhaps be able to make his escape before the punishment can be inflicted. Thus, so long as the law depends solely upon fear may be the condemnation of society.we have no security for its fulfilment, and as a matter of fact we know that it is constantly being violated.

And certainly the Law of God can never he obeyed through fear. Des pots may feel flattered as they see a population nale with terror at their ower. And they may not care much, f only outward obedlence is rendered ether there be behind it a feeling of lovalty or not But we cannot subnit to or obey God in any such manper. He is a King, and a Father who isks for love-asks for it because He gives His love to us. He says, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God; not, "Thou shalt dread the Lord thy God." This is not only the first and great commandment, but on it hang all the Law and the prophets.



SCHOOL LESSON

For February 11, 1912. THE SON IN HIS FATHER'S Luke 2:40-55.

Golden Text.-How is it that ye sought Me? Wist ye not that I must be in My, father's bouse? Luke 2:49. Twice Jesus was brought by His mother to the temple; once when He was an infant, and again when He was twelve years old; when He was to assume some of the responsibilities of manhood. The first time, He was hailed as the Messiah by two old saints, who were doubtless well known for their holiness of life. Tea is never good when long standing; but in some cases it cannot be helped. It should be poured off the leaves into another heated pot and covered with a "cozy."





Probably no greater national measure was ever presented to Congress after such prolonged, careful and earnest study as that recently re-ported by the monetary commission.

Its aim is the reform of the national money system-a reform the need of which is doubted only by those who fear lest any change in our financial laws may increase the "money power," and those who do not realize that of all the money systems of the world, ours is the most antiquated, the most complex, and the least adapted to the needs of a great commercial and industrial people. Although in some respects the richest nation on earth, we are the only nation that is subject to serious money panics. This state of affairs the bill seeks to remedy through the introduction in
