## Who Tore Up the Road?

Although I stated the facts in a former issue of the REPUBLICAN regarding the tearing to pieces of that portion of Main Road from Middle Road nearly to Broadway, I find that there are many who have not understood my explanation; and in order that the facts may be made clear to all I now make this statement.

The grading of Main Road, last spring, was decided upon only after a careful estimate of the cost before a lead was hauled. The overseer of highways had a book containing stubs, and the contractor had tickets. The contractor's bill was not paid until these tickets were handed in. The plan was to gravel two miles of road from the county line, and it was estimated that it would leave about \$350 for "incidental work." Had the committee's directions been followed, everything would have been all right. But here is what happened, and here are the witnesses.

The highway committee deemed it expedient to request every member of council, and also the overseer, to meet at Mr. Boyer's to discuss the availability of graveling Main Road. Those present were Messrs. Sutton, Boyer, Bachelor, Liebreich, Jacobs, Cunningham, and Bickford.

Mr. Boyer, secretary of the committee, opened the bids and kept a memorandum of the proceedings. Mr. Gay was not the lowest bidder, and would not have received the contract but for the earnest pleading of Mr. Bickford, overseer of highways, who gave as his reasons that there was certain work that he preferred Mr. Gay to perform. In compliance with this urgent request, the contract was given to Mr. Gay, members of council first stating that they preferred that the work be done by Mr. Bickford; but he objected, and the council yielded.

The cost of two miles of road from the county line, and all details, were discussed in Mr. Bickford's presence, and not a move was made without asking his advice. He not only agreed to what was adopted, but considered the graveling of the road an excellent movement. He had already been paid to measure exact distances from gravel pit, and as the roads leading into Main Road are half a mile apart, distances are easily computed. He was told to begin at the county line and build two miles

of road, which would end a little past Middle Road, about in front of Mr. H. M. Phillips' residence. The road was in fair condition on what we termed "Campanella's hill." The work was to be done under the supervision of the overseer, he to inform the contractor of what was required.

In addition to those already named as witnesses of the transactions at that meeting, and to show that what I here state is correct, I bring forward Mr. Bickford himself. If the contractor did not know where to begin and end, Mr. Bickford did, for when Mr. Gay tore up the road Mr. Bickford reported that he had "torn up the road beyond the two mile mark." When asked why he had allowed this to be done, he said, "I was not there at the time; the road was torn up before I got there."

I am willing to admit that Mr. Gay made a mistake, but the highway committee had nothing to do with the contractor; their business was with the overseer of highways, who should have seen that a good piece of road was not disturbed. He was paid for supervising that work, and should have placed a stake at the end of two miles.

I am not now a member of council, but write this in defence of the committee (in this case all members of council being present at the meeting), as they have nothing to do with supervising the days' work on roads, and did not order the road torn up. On the contrary, no parties were more surprised than they when told that it was done.

As to paying Mr. Gay's bill, there was no escape from paying a contractor who worked under orders of the overseer of highways. The contractor received no orders from the committee. Litigation to settle that point would have caused useless expense.

I am ready to affirm the above as the actual facts, and am sure that any one or all of the members of Council will corroborate my statement.

I trust that the committee will be given credit for "common sense," especially as six men gave their opinions. Every load of gravel beyond the two mile limit cost the town ten cents extra; that part of the road was good; a portion of the road money was required elsewhere; and every dollar was carefully invested on the highways. Yet, because the committee did not prevent something of which the members know nothing until it was done, the reports of the matter have circulated until they have actually reflected injuriously upon the very parties who objected to lavish expenditures.
