Regular convocation last Saturday evening, February 6th. All present.

Highway Committee reported completion of purchase of gravel land, except paying the money. Also, letter from Surveyor Middleton, promising early resumption of work on grade lines for streets.

Civic Club wrote, calling attention to condition of cross walks, and heaps of snow on sidewalks,—arguing improvements.

Fire Chief urged purchase of new ladders and truck,—much needed. Referred.

A. E. Holman, of Independent Fire Co., suggested that fines ought to be remitted when absence from fire is caused by service on jury. There were two such cases, but Council did not have power to make exceptions to provisions of ordinance. Referred.

Solicitor wrote concerning the appeal case of Black vs. Town,—stating that original proceedings were not properly begun; hence advice settlement. So voted.

A request that Backard Street be properly graded was referred; as was a petition asking that a portion of Obow Road be re-opened.

A resolution was adopted, directing the Treasurer to deposit Town money equally in Peoples Bank and Trust Company; Banks to pay two per cent interest on average daily balance over \$1,000, and in case called on to discount Town paper, they shall not charge over five per cent.

Voted, that a committee be appointed to visit Town's poor. If necessary, the Overseer to loan poor families a reasonable sum per week. Mayor appointed Messrs. Skinner, Baker and Wood.

Fire Committee instructed to secure bids for ladder truck.

Collector Davis made return of uncollectable taxes for 1908, amounting to \$351.42, asking abatement for same. Granted. Also \$53.45 of 1907 taxes, which were abated.

Collector also presented list of delinquents for 1908, which was filed.

Mr. Skinner introduced an ordinance establishing fire limits,—beginning at Egg Harbor Road and Vine Street; along Vine to northwest corner Vine and Third to Orchard; to Railroad Avenue; to Egg Harbor Road; to place of beginning; that within said limits no frame buildings shall be erected. Passed first reading.
