

HEART OF COEUR DE LEON.

Cardiac Organ of the First Bichard Is 

In the splendid cathedral church of Romen is a suite of three or four rooms containing what is known as the "Tresor," This is a collection of valuable and interesting relice, forming quite a little museum, to which-admission may be obtained for the modest fee of 25 centimes. To an Ani glo-Saxon quite the most interesting article in the collection is the plain leaden casket in which was buried the heart of the famous King Richard Coeur De Leon, who, it will be remembered, was slain by a bolt from the crossbow of Bertraud De Gourdon at the siege of the castle of Chaluz. His body was buried at the feet of his father at Fontrevault, near Tours, but his heart was incased in two leaden caskets and burled to the cathedral of Rouen, "the faithful city,"

The exact place of its burial seems to have been forgotten, but it was rereceptacle and reburied in the choir. The old leaden cases, the outer one of which was in a most dilanidated condition, were placed in the "Thesor" with the following inscription:



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

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## **Extracts from Letters Received.**

New Orleans, Tuesday, Feb. 6.-The soow bas extended well to the South, for there were spots of it in South Carolina and down into Georgia; but when we woke up in Mobile, this morning, it was a different climate. We saw some of the effects of the storm there, a year or so ago. Acres and acres of fine trees blown down or broken off-trees a foot or more through, broken off six to ten feet from the ground. This afternoon we took an auto ride. There were roses blooming in the yards, and we saw, orango trees with ripe fruit on. But 'the greatest sight was the comstories. The dead are buried on top of the ground, as it is only about two or three feet to water. They build vaults of brick, stone or marble. The wealthy have their own. We were in one cometery where the chcapest was \$2500, aud on up. The poorer churches, lodges, etc., have large vaults, with spaces just large enough to put a coffin in endways, and then they are sealed up, not to be opened for two years. Then what temains is taken out and burned, and the space used for others. In one such yault of about forty spaces, over 500 people bave been burled.--

On the train between San Francisco and New Orleans, Sunday .- We\_are travelling through a barren country, about 4400 feet above sea level. It does not look as if enough grew on the land to feed a mouse; but evidently something does grow, for we often see cattle ecattered over the plains. Since leaving San Antonio, yesterday morning at nine o'clock, we have not seen a tree. larger than a buckleberry bush. Yesterday we saw a man who said it was not safe to count on less than 18 acres to each animal. We were sitting out on the wend of the observation -car last night, until 9 o'clock, with my overcoat unbuttoned. We arrived at El Paso this Monday morning, at half past eight


