A Real Nuisance.

MR. EDITOR: After reading in the last issue of your paper the claim of Rev. Mr. Sharpe for one hundred dollars for chickens killed by dogs, I smiled, and thought that I too would like to put in my claim for loss due to the same cause,—stray hungry dogs.

Not mentioning previous losses, and they have been many, I will mention only the most recent one. Some months ago, while we were working on a neighboring farm, a stray dog within two weeks carried away twenty-one of my finest Minorca hens, for which I would not have taken less than thirty dollars. This is a positive fact, for we at last caught the culprit and put him out of existence.

I presume Mr. Sharpe's call is not so much for the money as it is to have the dog law enforced, for the general public good.

Many people, especially my countrymen (Italians), are great lovers of dogs. They want to raise and keep every dog that comes to light, thoughtlessly and childishly, not taking into consideration the responsibility of feeding and housing the animals, and training them to stay on their own premises. This is the real purpose in keeping a good dog, and not permit it to roam about the country looking everywhere for something to eat.

I do not know how much people suffer in other parts of Hammonton, but in our section of town we are greatly troubled. Being in the vicinity of horse-killer's rancho, this is a regular dog's rendezvous. Our younger children are also troubled, and always go in fear of meeting these prowlers; and most of the time must go with older children, or else have grown folks to accompany them past the danger point. One year of strict vigilance and enforcing of the law would rid us of these pests, to the happiness of all concerned.


