Electric Lights.

A new Electric Light Company has
been formed, and will be incorporated,
to purchase and operate the Hammon-
ton plant if their request made of our
Town Council is granted,—that is, to so
amend the ordinance that the Company
may charge three-fourths of a cent per
hour for commercial lights, instead of
being limited to one-half cent. It has
been demonstrated that the lower price
will not pay, and it is less than is
charged elsewhere. Many consumers
have given written consent to pay the
advanced rates. No doubt Council will
act favorably this evening. The author-
ized capital of the Company is \$25,000,
with \$11,500 paid in. The officers are:

President, R. J. Byrnes.
Sec. & Treas., F. J. Thron, cashier of
the Union Security and Guaranty
Company, Philadelphia.
Manager, Geo. E. Brett, Philadelphia.

Mr. Brett is an experienced man in the
business, as is also his assistant, Mr.
Syd. Vertz, of Philadelphia. It is pro-
posed to make such immediate additions
and improvements to the plant as are
necessary to put it in first-class condi-
tion, to give more satisfactory service,
and protect against such lapses, from
accident, as have occurred in the past.

At a special meeting of the Baptist

This was a complete surprise, but after
an explanation by the pastor, his resi-
gnation was regretfully accepted. Mr.
Athey has accepted the pastorate of a
Church of 700 members, in Lynchburg,
Virginia, his native state.

Watson B. Matthews, Principal
of the public schools at Madison, N. J.,
formerly of Hammonton, has recently
been appointed County Superintendent
of Schools in that county—Warren. In
accepting his resignation, the Board of
Education adopted a series of resolu-
tion exceedingly complimentary. When
Mr. Matthews took charge of the schools
at Madison, eight years ago, there was
one building, four teachers, and about
170 pupils enrolled. Now there are
four buildings, twelve teachers, and
nearly five hundred pupils. The schools
have been graded, and now stand in the
highest rank. The Board ask Mr. M.
to continue in charge until the close of
the term, in June.
