Gentlemen:—Allow me to say a few words in your valued paper in regard to the approach to the down-town fire company's premises, change of which you have advocated.

It is indeed an unfortunate thing that the gutter "box" was removed, costing thirty-odd dollars for work which will eventually be done over again. In talking with members of the company, they express themselves as satisfied with a straight approach; and several stated that they would not risk themselves again in front of the engine or hose wagon, as at least two have been thrown, narrowly escaping serious injury.

It is rumored that Town Council is opposed to approaches extending over the gutter, on Bellevue. This is a correct decision; but every city fire company and police station is allowed whatever convenience and safeguard they deem necessary; and the one proposed is seen everywhere.

Doubtless, members of Council have been rushed the apparatus out of the building, tumbled over themselves, and are now top up of the opinion that the Volunteer Fire Company is right.

As a real estate man, I appreciate the fire ladders, and say, give them all possible conveniences for fire fighting and for personal safety.

BOARD OF TRADE.

A baker's dozen constituted the patriotic citizens who attended Tuesday evening's meeting of our Board of Trade, among them being President Phillips and Secretary Cunningham.

Correspondence had been carried on since the last meeting, with a textile manufacturing company in Philadelphia, who wished to move here. The information received is as follows: They have \$5000 capital, and manufacture Turkish towels, curtains, etc. They want a building with five or ten thousand square feet of floor space; would wish transportation charges to be paid by Board. The only available building of that size being occupied, the President was authorized to continue correspondence.

Chief of the Weather Bureau, at Washington, reported the average precipitation as follows, showing that Hammonton is favored with more rain (including melted snow) than the other two points:

Philadelphia, 39.84 inches per year for 25 years

Atlantic City, for 25 years, 42.71 inches.

Hammonton, for eight years, 44.76 inches.
