ON VOTING.

Our town election is close at hand. Questions of policy and principle are soon to be decided by the citizens of Hammonton; but, as yet, there seems to be a lack of interest in this event on the part of voters. Why is this the case? I, for one, am utterly unable to understand how a citizen of the United States, clothed with the tremendous power of suffrage, can remain wholly indifferent as to whether he votes, or how he votes. That voting is one of the most important duties of citizenship will be denied by no thinking man. One that stands by while a brother is being murdered is an accessory to the crime, according to both civil and moral law. He that sits idly at home while a primary or regular election is being held, is jointly responsible with the officers for the evils of misgovernment. Let no one try to shirk the responsibilities of suffrage. It will be of no avail, since he has the power actively to stand up for the right as he sees it, and this power necessarily makes one responsible in part for the welfare of the State.

Ours is a commercial age. We are wont to ask what a certain course of action will profit us, temporally. Even in our Churches, this same spirit is sometimes found. Indeed, it pervades nineteenth century life as a deadly gas pervades the air of a room. But this is wholly wrong. The soldier in the front rank that should ask how he could save his life would be deemed a coward, and rightly so. The hero loves his home and country well, but is willing to die, if need be, rather than endanger his cause by considering his physical welfare. It is exactly the same in regard to voting. He that votes in a certain way for his own gain is a traitor to his country; but he that votes as conscience dictates, regardless of consequences, is as truly a hero as the bravest soldier that ever bore a gun.

I have no quarrel with the man that is true to his honestly gotten convictions, be he infidel or Christian, Democrat or Republican, in favor of license or against; but to me there is nothing more despicable, nothing more unmanly, than to vote a certain way merely for personal gain.

Last year, for the first time in its history, Hammonton voted in favor of license. Many men did not vote, and the majority was small. If, on the strength of that vote, a man spent several thousand dollars, that is absolutely no reason why another man should do despite to his convictions by voting to continue a license policy. Principle, not false sympathy, should determine how each one should vote.

Let every voter in Hammonton be convinced in his own mind in regard to the license question, then do his duty, both at caucus and on election day. If this be done, none need fear the result. T. C. S.
