Foundation of Real Greatness.
(Extracts from Lady Henry Somerset's New
Year's address before the W.C.T.U.)
What can we learn, as we look over
the untrodden way, dim still in the mist
of the future? We realize that the
century has closed in darkness, that it
is not a time of peace, but of strife,
that there comes a word of warning
above the noisy celebrations of our vic-
tories; and that word, I think, is
Responsibility. A patriotism that is
wholly noble and worthy the name
must realize that real greatness is ever
built on the foundation of Peace, Tem-
perance, and Purity, and that the only
standard by which greatness can be
measured, be it in the State or in the
individual soul, is the measure of Christ
himself.

We cannot look across the golden
light of new opportunities without see-
ing the shadows that fall across the
way. We realize that the danger which
threatens us as a nation, and conse-
quently as individuals, is the love of
ease and money that is growing to be a
national passion, the increasing power
of the drink monopoly which threatens
to rule our politics, the impurity which
stalks abroad in our streets, the pau-
perism that disgraces us as a nation.
These things must still come to us as
shadows in the path that lies ahead.
If this is so, let us not forget the lesson
we have to learn in the last year of the
century, a lesson written in tears at
home, and on the tombs of the dead out-
yonder.

To us, the untrodden path lies before
us to-day. We do not know how many
steps we shall be called to take, whether
the way be long or short; but of one
thing we may be sure,—the way of each
of us is the way of the cross, for the
way of the cross is the way of light, and
if we are to build up the greatness of a
nation, or the greatness of our own
characters, which go to make a nation,
we have to look to Christ as the Sover-
eign and Teacher of our lives.
May this year bring us new enthusi-
asms, new inspirations, new devotions,
new consecration.

About School Matters.

As the time approaches for holding
the annual school meeting, a few
thoughts from me upon this subject
may not be amiss. There has been
much complaint, lately, concerning
the amount of money that the town is
expending upon our schools; and no
doubt exists in my mind that this
complaint springs largely from the
utter unfamiliarity of the bulk of our
citizens with matters that appertain to
the schools and their administration.
For a number of years past, the
school meetings have been attended
by so few people that an attendant
upon them must be led to believe that
the subject of schools was barren of
interest to nine-tenths of our people.
Do my fellow citizens realize what
this may lead to? In the past we, as
a community, have been blessed with
Boards of Education of the highest
executive ability, and they have ful-
filled the requirements of their office
with the most scrupulous fidelity.
Yet that these same Boards have felt
keenly the apathy displayed in school
matters, goes without saying. It is
just as apparent that the town has not
received as great benefit from these
distinguished services as they would
have done had the people taken the
interest they ought, and outlined the
policies to be pursued.

We spend annually, in behalf of our
schools, an amount equal to all other
town appropriations, yet our school
meetings, representing a population
of over four thousand, are conducted
by from twenty to forty voters out of
a poll list of more than seven hun-
dred. Now this status of affairs is in
the face of the fact, well understood
by all, that the continued well-being
of the town largely depends upon the
proper administration of our schools,
and the adaptation of that adminis-
tration and expenditure to the particu-
lar needs of our community.

The school meeting is a privilege.
It is direct legislation by the commu-
nity. This, with the town meeting,
is one of the highest grants of power
known to a democratic form of gov-
ernment. Then, by all means, let all
citizens give this matter the thought
it deserves, and let the coming annual
school meeting be graced by your
presence, and be benefitted by your

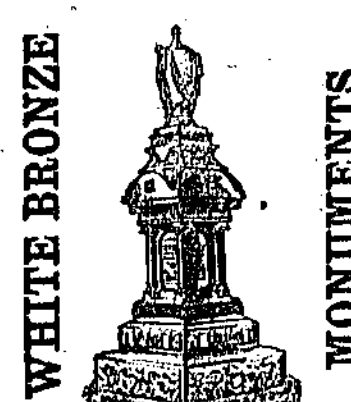

Here's for Health.

A movement has been inaugurated to boom Hammonton as a health resort. The projectors have good basis for their claim, although the town lacks many things usually considered necessary in such an institution as is planned. It is well known that we have a clean, porous soil, which prevents malarious exhalations, a climate more equable than is common in the north temperate zone, good water, good traveling facilities, good foods fresh from the fields, and a salt air tempered from brisk ocean winds by miles of pine and cedar. Here is restful quiet, too, so desirable for those whose frames are racked by painful disease, or exhausted by nervous disorders. We have skilled physicians, also, who will minister to those who need such care.

The movement referred to came to light last Saturday night, when Council was asked to allow the use of Council Room to hold meetings of those interested. This was granted, of course, and the first meeting was held on Wednesday evening. There were not many there, as the matter had hardly come to public notice as yet; but there was a very unanimous sentiment in favor of expending money and time in advertising the merits of the town as indicated.

Mr. Byrnes gave some account of early efforts in this direction, and the good results; also incidents of benefits derived from residence here. Dr. Reed endorsed the project, and gave some details of the wholesale advertising of Atlantic City, with resultant influx of visitors and permanent residents, and great increase in property values.

Others present related their experience and results of observation, and all concurred in the belief that Hammonton might be greatly benefited by judicious advertising.

Finally, it was decided to place the matter in the hands of two committees, which were appointed,—one to secure the necessary money; the other, composed of physicians, to prepare matter for articles which are to be used in medical and other magazines, setting forth the advantages of Hammonton for the care and comfort of suffering humanity.

May the new move prove successful, and result in the good of all concerned.
