## LAW AND ORDER.

[Written by C. E. FOWLER, in several parts.]  
PART III. Object of Law and Order.

We do some things in order to accomplish certain other things. We sow in order to reap. If we want bread there is a certain order to be pursued if we hope to succeed,—we must prepare the soil, plant the seed, reap the grain, grind it, then bake the bread.

In order that this earth may be fit for the habitation of men, it is necessary to have first the mineral, second the vegetable, third the animal kingdom. This order is necessary, whether the planet is developed according to divine or natural laws, or both. In the development of society a certain order of growth is necessary, beginning with despotism and ending with freedom, with a long list of intermediate stages,—republicanism being one, the one that a large part of society is to-day struggling to attain, but which we are far from reaching.

A few years ago it was considered moral for one man to hold other men as chattels (slaves), and that domineering feeling is not all gone yet. In fact, there are very few men to-day who do not at times have some desire to attend to other people's business, and tell them what they ought to do. Some go so far as to try to compel others to do according to their convictions of right.

I am trying to prove to the reader that society is progressing, and that progress is and must necessarily be in a certain order; and I dwell upon this point because there is a class of persons who, if they think they can prove that any part of society one hundred years ago was ahead of any part of society to-day, or because we don't build pyramids as they did ages ago (though they did it by brute force), claim that society is going backward; and any one who does not realize that society is a progressive entity need not trouble himself to read farther, as all my remarks will be based upon the idea that society is going forward, and that its intelligent members are struggling towards freedom. This implies that some members are encroaching upon the freedom of others. To illustrate my point, I will do as friend Jacobs occasionally does, be a little personal; but I will try to confine my personalities to myself (no reflection intended).

When I came to Hammonon to live, one great inducement was that this was a temperance town, at least in name, and they did not have signs up inviting all the bums and drunkards to come there and drink. It is well known that the first settlers in this country had but little trouble with the Indians until they commenced to steal their lands and sell them intoxicating drinks. Admitting that a man has a right to drink all he has a mind to, and get as drunk as he chooses, even with money that belongs to his wife and family, I think that every sober man will agree with me that he has no right, while in that condition to enter public places and assault, murder, or insult peaceable citizens, or to destroy their property; and when such actions become habitual with drunkards, people have a right to prevent as far as possible the cause of such conduct. And when the officers of a town like Hammonon, contrary to the wishes of a majority of its citizens (I include the ladies), license saloons to sell such stuff, they take upon themselves great responsibilities.

It is a fundamental principle in all business that he who takes the profits should also stand the losses; and I think it no more than right that since the town has gone into the business of licensing the sale of intoxicating drinks, that at least part of the money thus received should be used in paying damages done by drunken people in town, and that that part of the license fee not devoted to supporting the poor (most of whom are poor in consequence of drink) should be reserved for that purpose.

**AN ORDINANCE** to provide for the preservation of the peace, establishing certain misdemeanors, and fixing the penalties for violations of this ordinance.

Introduced Dec. 31, 1898.  
Passed Feb. 26, 1899.  
It is ordained by the Town of Hammonon, in Council assembled,—

That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to discharge firearms, fireworks, or fire crackers, except on July 4th in each year, and such other days as the Town Council may specially designate, in any of the streets, alleys, and roadways, and close proximity thereto, in the Town of Hammonon; to use loud, violent, abusive, profane, or indecent language; to indulge in fighting or other violent conduct; to perpetrate any malicious mischief, such as defacing buildings or other property, breaking windows or otherwise injuring or destroying property.

And be it further ordained, That it is and shall be the duty of the police officials of the Town of Hammonon to arrest or cause the arrest, with or without warrant, of any and all persons violating the terms of this ordinance, and to cause the person or persons so arrested to be proceeded against before a Justice of the Peace, as provided by an ordinance entitled "An ordinance relating to the method of procedure before a Justice of the Peace or other magistrate in violation of any of the ordinances of the Town of Hammonon," passed August 23, 1895.

And be it further ordained, That the penalty for any violation for a violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be by a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding ten days in the County Jail, at the discretion of the presiding magistrate.
