Town Election and the Issues.

Last year, at our town election, there was but one real issue, if we take no account of the individual contests outside of the Council ticket. At that time this issue was clear and distinct. Those who favored license in any degree voted for it, and those opposed to it for any cause voted against it. To-day, the issues are not so easily defined. It is more difficult to decide how we ought to vote to be true to our principles. That the clear issue of last year was to become somewhat beclouded was made quite apparent by the so-called "Liberal" ticket. I use the term "so-called" advisedly. What a parody on Liberty, to place her at the head of a license ticket! Surely the men who devised the name knew how to discriminate between liberty and license! Liberty is found only in implicit obedience to the laws of one's mind or of nature. License is unnatural freedom. License is meant when they cry liberty. License is as inimical to perfect freedom as is improper restraint. This must be apparent to every one, and so need not be here enlarged upon.

The general tone of the "Liberal" ticket, as well as the known views of the men whose names appeared on it, showed clearly to thinking men that the fight was no longer as to whether or not there should be one or two decent hotels in town, or none, but as to whether or not the town should be dotted with gin-shops. This fact is brought very clearly when one considers that at least one candidate on the ticket has offered to guarantee licenses galore in case the nominees on that ticket should be elected. To the uninitiated, this seems like a very questionable bid for votes.

It seems rather strange, also, that factional party strifes should have been dragged into our town affairs; still, this appears to have been done. Delegates to a recent party convention seem to have been cut from spite. If this be a fact, it is very unwise politics.

There is also a very noticeable lowering in the general quality of the license ticket. Could they not have avoided this? If not, the party is not so strong and manly as when last seen in the field. Possibly this results from the euphemistic speakers of the party.

There is not space to develop these thoughts, and we must summarize hastily. The facts mentioned above in regard to offers of licenses should be considered by those in favor of one or two orderly hotels in town. If one prefers twelve saloons to no hotel, that one should vote the regular nomination ticket; but if one prefers no hotel to several saloons, that one should surely vote for the candidates for Council who were defeated Tuesday night. Also those not in full accord with the personnel of the "Liberal" ticket, as well as those who believe that party politics and factional fights should find no place in town elections, ought carefully to consider how best they can serve the truth as they see it.

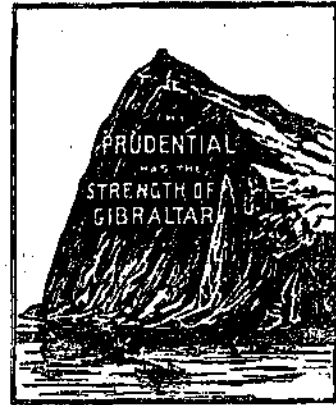

Clerk directed to request of attorneys an outline of proceeding to remove said parties; also, whether Town can collect amount already expended for the family's relief.

Electric Light Company made written proposal to extend hours of lighting from sunset to sunrise for \$2400 per year, and will then give six months of light. If this is accepted, they will put in a second dynamo, giving "direct arc" lights for streets. Referred to the town meeting.

Fooling the Italians.

The rum faction intend to fool the people just before election as it did last year. I understand that the Italian voters are promised low license fees and everybody a license if they will walk up and be fooled again this year.

By referring to the REPUBLICAN of August 21st last, will be found the following relating to a special meeting of Council held on Aug. 14th:

"Mr. Jacobs then offered an amendment reducing the license fee from \$300 to \$100, that there might be no monopoly of the business. Not seconded."

It will be noticed that I made a motion for all licenses to expire in May. Both Mr. Ballard and Mr. Andrews (see above) voted for my motion. At the next meeting Mr. Andrews came forward and moved to undo the very work he had done at the previous meeting. Just why he did so can explain better than can be done by another.

The ordinance was held back until late in the year, and Mr. Jacobs was killed off by the very man who voted license to others.

The license faction will try to smooth it over now, and fool the Italians again. I recall the above to show that the license members would not even second a \$100 license fee, that is, would not even allow it to come before Council. Now they claim to be the friends of the poor dupes they duped, and pretend to favor a low fee, after pronouncing that "Hammonton only wants a hotel, that's all."

If you want a license, and are determined to have it, go ahead. I prefer a dozen hotels, rather than to run the town in the interest of one man. A hotel may be a good thing (for the proprietor), but I do not see how any other party is benefited, nor do I believe that the whole town and all the Italians should be swallowed up so that one or two men can run hotels and make lots of money.

And the speak easier still flourish, and the beer wagon makes its daily calls. F. H. JACOBS.
