Committee Meeting.

Council's License Committee met on Tuesday evening, as advertised, to consider three applications. It didn't take much time to complete their business,—adjourned at 8.10.

There were no protests against Frank Jacobs' petition, and it was referred back to Council with a recommendation that the license be granted.

William Ortolf—sent verbal request that his application be withdrawn; but Committee had no authority to grant this. Written remonstrances were then read, and the petition sent to Council with a recommendation that a license be not granted.

James Pinto's application was also turned down; there being a written protest and considerable objection to a saloon on Middle Road.

Chas. A. Wood, Chairman of the Highway Committee, called to order the two-score and more property owners on Bellevue, his committee desiring to know what they wanted as a "permanent improvement."—Town Meeting having voted \$1000 for that special purpose.

Quite a number took part in the discussion, each one seemingly having his own view on the matter. But one vote was taken, which expressed the sentiment of the meeting, that the money could be most profitably expended in extending the paved gutters which now reach only to Horton Street.

Several kinds of street paving were discussed, each of them "the best," but all agreed that Hammonton's little improvement fund would buy only a small sample of any of these, and our people are not in financial shape to raise the many thousands required to continue the good work.

After long discussion of ways and means, the legal status of the Council, material and labor, and every other possible phase, the general sentiment seemed to be in favor of extending the paved gutters, using concrete instead of brick, then remove several inches of mud from the street and replace it with a heavy coating of the excellent coarse gravel from the Main Road beds.
