


FIGURE 1. THOURE 2.

Most. people know that the warm air surrounding the "earth is only a thin belt, but we do not most of, us know that at ten miles above the earth it would not only be bitterly cold, but the sun would appear quite different." The air is stratified in three more or less distinct layers. In the lowest we live. It extends about two miles and is a region of turmoil, whimsical winds, cyclones and anticyclones. At two miles the freezing point is reached and then there is a second stratum extending upward for about another six miles. Here the air grows steadily colder and drier, the lowest temperature recorded being 167 degrees below freezing point. Here the air moves in great planetary swirls produced by the spinning of the earth on its axis, so that the wind always blows in the same castorly direction.


