The ladies have taken this space by the

may contain.

In Atlantic City, February business  
in the police department was not so  
brisk as in the month of January.  
There were fifty-two arrests in the  
month just closed, as against sixty-  
six in the month that preceded it.  
Intoxication was the cause of much  
more than half of the policemen's  
troubles,—thirty-one cases being set  
down to the credit, or discredit, of this  
one cause alone. The entry on the  
House Sergeant's blotter, "Disorderly,"  
appeared thirteen times during the  
month of twenty-eight days. There  
were eleven prisoners locked up on a  
charge of drunk and disorderly, in  
which a limited indulgence in liquor  
is generally understood to be the pri-  
mary cause of disorder.

Just, seventy-one prisoners were  
accused of being plain "drunk."

Notwithstanding all this, and more,  
certain ministers advocate public opin-  
ion and the opening of the Sunday  
saloons, in preference to law and order  
and the observance of the Christian  
Sabbath. Such men would make  
better bar-tenders than ambassadors  
of Christ.

**School Meeting.**

The District Clerk has issued his call for the Annual School Meeting, naming Central School House as the place for holding same, and Tuesday, March 18th, at three o'clock, as the time.

May we repeat what we have so often said,—that this is the most important meeting of the year, in Hammoncton. Why? because we there elect men to care for our schools and expend many thousands of dollars of our hard earned cash; and this year (as last) we are asked to vote to raise by taxation \$6075 toward supporting these schools.

This year we have to elect four members of the Board of Education, in place of Thos. C. Elvins [resigned], J. L. O'Donnell, Mrs. J. H. Ransom, and Mrs. Elias A. Joslyn. None of those named will consent to serve another term. Of course, the sum mentioned above is only a portion of the cost of maintaining the schools. Last year we received from the State \$8997.64; and the Board paid out \$14,399.66, while the total amount paid by our Town Council was only \$6369.91. Are we not correct in calling this the most important meeting of the year? And yet we have known of men who never attended the annual school meeting, though they became greatly excited over the election of three Councilmen!

Remember, all ladies over twenty-one years of age have a right to vote in this meeting, except on the election of the Board. Why this exception was made no one knows, as they can and do serve as members of said Board, in Hammoncton and elsewhere.

**The Primary Election.**

Union Hall was well filled, last Saturday night, at the town caucus. A considerable hustling had been done by the various candidates who were willing to serve the dear people—for a consideration.

Called to order by Town Clerk J. L. O'Donnell; M. L. Jackson was chosen chairman. There was but little preliminary work, and a printed ticket was used to make nominations for the nominations. It took considerable time for the crowd to vote, and more time to count the ballots. The result was as follows:

Tuesday, another ticket was nominated "by petition," with Daniel M. Ballard, Manly Austin, and F. Henry Jacobs for Councilmen; Elias A. Joslyn for Overseer of Highways; Thos. H. Cogsey for Justice. The balance of the ticket is the same as the regular nomination. They call it the "Reform Ticket."
