To the Town Council, and Oilizens of Hammonton:

4th, This Company means to equip a duplicate plant at the earliest possible moment, thereby insuring against any bronk downs. We have already increased the working force of our plant, by adding a competent electrician and engineer. You have the constant attoudance of our BuperIntendent and General Manager, who is beyond a doubt an able nian to cope with the intricacion of an electric plant to give officient service, and is thoroughly familfar with all electrical appliances. We are at present ravisles the electrical construction at the power house, and you will agree with us that a marked change la noticcable.

Now then centlemen, it is not necessary for us to go further into detail; as you are thoroughly aware of the existing conditions; and if you act favorably apon our request it simply means your

salvation as to electric lights; if you don't, you may took forward to the nonoperation of an electric light plant in Hammonton, so far as we are concerned: therefore we are thoroughly convinced that Hammonton contains too many intelligent people to stand in their own light, by refusing the requested revision, and we hope that you will take immediate action, thereby avoiding any delay in our contemplated duplication of the present plant, etc. Should your action prove favorable as to the revision, we would be pleased to have you insert our corporate name in the ownership of said ordinance or franchise.
