by the "Colliers' Weekly," the editor  
of the "Ladies' Home Journal," and

patent medicines. The omnipresent  
"Peruna," for example, is one-quarter  
alcohol. A person can easily get

bitters, contain even a larger per cent  
of alcohol, and these are all sold freely  
in prohibition territory! Indeed, it is

patent medicines than is sold over the  
saloon bar in the form of whisky and  
wine; and this amount is largely  
drunk by the women of our land! It  
is the taste for alcoholic drink created  
by these patent medicines which is  
relied on by the manufacturers to  
perpetuate the demand for them.

Here is a gigantic evil to which the  
temperance forces of the country must  
give vigorous attention.

### Clubs Are Trumps in Hammonton.

Few towns of its size have been so be-  
clubbed as Hammonton. Harking back  
twenty years, many of us call to mind  
the good work performed by the Acme  
Club, then in the zenith of its glory.  
The entertainments given by this com-  
pany may have been equalled, but never  
excelled by amateurs.

"Backward, turn backward, O Time, in  
thy flight."  
And give us a play by that Club just for  
tonight.

Then came the O. D. Club,—a star  
of lesser magnitude, which, while it  
pleased its patrons in a measure, never  
attained the dramatic altitude of its  
predecessor. Both have long since  
passed over the Great Divide.

Since then, at intervals, other clubs  
of different styles and purposes have  
sprung to the surface, being blessed  
with a longer or shorter life, (generally  
shorter). Among these we recall the  
Hammonton Social Club, which flour-  
ished for a brief period. Then a few  
small affairs, of the two for a nickel  
kind, were thrown on the town for good  
measures.

At another time, the Hammonton  
Historical Club was almost visible,—  
but was a still-born unfortunate. Later  
on, the New England Club attracted  
some attention, and for a time flour-  
ished, affording its members innocent  
enjoyment. Upon changing the name,  
however, meteor like, it flashed out  
brightly, and expired in blazing.

Still later, poker clubs and anchor  
clubs have held sway, until society  
seemed to be dangerously near the last  
ditch, when some inspired soul invented  
the "Civic Club." Its members buckled  
on the sword of Gideon, and protected  
by the shield of respectability, have  
waged war, intermittently, against pub-  
lic nuisances generally. The Club has  
corralled the garbage, and butted into  
some other unpleasant propositions.  
There is one nuisance, however, which  
so far has not been abated. Whether  
the Civic Club is equal to the task, or  
whether the members would have the  
nerve to attempt it, and that is clearing  
out the useless dogs that roam at large  
through the town.

Were the Council authorized to grant  
a bounty of twenty-five cents for every  
dog deservedly shot, I think many peo-  
ple in town would sleep better. Or, if  
members of said Civic Club desire to  
immortalize themselves, let them be  
granted the privilege of practicing with  
six-shooters until they are able to hit a  
dog in their own door yard; then let  
Council sit 'em on. Even should some  
few accidentally shoot their own dogs,  
they would have the satisfaction of  
knowing they had not altogether wasted  
their ammunition.

Only one club appears to have been  
free from petty jealousies and ungodly  
ambition,—the one that swings, pendu-  
lum-like, from the wrists of the night-  
watchman. May it long be blessed  
with a peaceful existence, and never  
feel the necessity of going on a strike.

Volunteer Fire Company's ap-  
paratus has been re-arranged, the rub-  
bish in the back corner removed, and  
the men find that there is plenty of  
room for a full sized ladder truck. It  
will probably be voted to-night.
