

Another Year of License.

Of course we are disappointed, there is no use in trying to disguise that; but we made a strong, clean fight, and have nothing to regret except the result. Can the "Liberal" managers say as much?
The town is no worse off now than it was last year. — Council stands 4 to 2, for license. But if all promises are kept, there will be many open bar-rooms in Hammoncton.
It took the liquor men many years to wipe, and temperance men may have to work more than one year more to regain control. In the mean time, friends, be on guard. We loathe the liquor business, and regard it as one of the most dangerous enemies to good order, morality, and religion, hence must be ready to give it battle anywhere, any time.

Tuesday was an agreeable day, and the vote heavy for Spring election. — 291 in the first precinct, 245 in the second; 536 votes out of 682 on the register. Candidates and others had kept the town lively for two weeks, and worked faithfully until the polls closed. Everybody kept good-natured, and the contest waged peacefully. Here is the vote:

TOWN MEETING.

Chas. Woodcutt elected Chairman. J. L. O'Donnell, Secretary.

L. M. Parkhurst offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Town Council be authorized to allow a rebate of \$4 per year for all teams carrying one ton or more and using a 4-inch tire, and that the amount necessary be used to defray expenses be taken from any balance left in town treasury.

Bill of D. M. Ballard, salary as Councilman, referred to town meeting, brought up. Moved by Mr. Attkin, that all members of Council be paid \$20 for the past year. Carried.

The question of procuring a map for assessors' use, brought up. After considerable discussion, Mr. H. J. Monfort moved that Council be instructed to get a map of the town, to give notes therefor, payable in three annual payments. Carried.

Mr. Anderson moved that the Town Clerk's salary be \$125. Carried.

Same moved that all salaries not provided for be the same as last year. A substitute was offered and carried, that Councilmen be paid \$20.

Three propositions for water supply presented, and referred to Council without recommendation. If they think it advisable, they shall call a special town meeting to decide the question.

The question of additional electric lights was laid on the table.

Adjourned.
