About Electric Lights.

Hammonton, N. J., March 10, 1897.

To the Citizens of Hammonton:

Owing to the fact of Council having
passed the amended light ordinance, I
did not think it necessary to say any-
thing in town meeting; but we will now
proceed with our work as quickly as
possible.

I would also like to correct some ru-
mors that are going around. I am not
connected in any way with the Egg
Harbor people, nor with any other en-
terprise except the Hammonton plant.
I have never been in Jenkintown over
one hour in my life, and I do not know
any person who is in the electric busi-
ness there. I have had privileges no-
where else, nor put in any other central
stations. I will challenge any one to
prove other than I say. Further, I
have never tried to sell either the fran-
chise or the contract given us here, as I
have heard it said.

I have moved here, and become a
citizen, for no other purpose than to
fulfill our part of the agreement that you
directed Council to make with us last
October, and we would have had the
lights on long ago had the last clause of
the proposition which we then made
been carried out. That clause read as
follows: "We are ready to begin opera-
tions at once, and could have light on
your streets in thirty days from date of
privilege granted, if it is granted imme-
diately."

After-Claps of the Election.

If the vote on license was "an expres-

was really informal, not legal. Without

not counted.

the Records. The voter was liable to be
governed by the heading. An indepen-
dent candidate should have had a ticket
that did not deceive.

Alex. Aiken. He favors license, but
does not want a bar-room. He claims
that a "side-board" for guests is all that
is necessary, and he has a supreme con-
tempt for places that permit boys and
anybody to secure liquor. Everybody
knows where he stands, and he doesn't
believe in deceit on the license question.

That "long and sorrowful face" of
Burgess was enough to make an allig-
ator weep, but he bristled up lively after
the count. No doubt he will give every
fellow a job who applies, this year.

The attempt to draw lines on religion
was shameful. Every man should do
his own thinking, and to create sectarian
prejudice is to strengthen the army of
"sinners."

Election clerks should be exact, and
not correct their tallies according to the
next man's sheet.

All the "rulings" by election officers
were against "no license."

the School Board free—no salaries now
—which means a loss to me of \$100 in
two years; but the town did right in so
voting.

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AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance granting to John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, full power to use all the public roads, highways, streets, avenues, and alleys in the Town of Hammononton for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating works for the supply and distribution of electric lights, heat or power in said Town of Hammononton," passed Dec. 8, 1896.

Introduced February 27th, 1897. Passed March 6th, 1897.

1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammononton, in the County of Atlantic, that Section three of the ordinance of which this ordinance is amendatory be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

That the said works must be completed and in operation on or before the 14th day of June, A. D. 1897, provided that the said John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, shall first signify and file with the Town Clerk their consent in writing to the regulations hereby imposed by the said Town of Hammononton.

That the said consent in writing shall be filed with the Town Clerk within ten days after the passage of this ordinance.

That in case the said John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns shall fail or neglect to operate said works at any time after their completion, for a period of ten consecutive days, then the power hereby granted shall be deemed forfeited by the said John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, and they shall, upon ten days' notice in writing to be given by the said Town of Hammononton, forthwith remove the said poles or poles, together with the wires and fixtures from the said public roads, highways, streets, avenues, and alleys.

That the Town of Hammononton shall have right to purchase said works at any time after the expiration of ten years from the passage of this ordinance, at its actual value, and that said value shall be determined and ascertained by three disinterested persons to be appointed for that purpose in such manner as the said Town of Hammononton and the said John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, shall hereafter agree upon by contract in writing.

That the construction and repairs shall be under the approval of the Board of Underwriters, the wiring and lighting to be done in a manner not to violate the insurance policies on any building or goods therein, in the Town of Hammononton.

That all poles shall be located and erected, and wires strung, under the direction of the Highway Committee, in a manner to avoid injury to trees and other property.

That the said John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, shall and will during the maintenance and operation of the said works furnish electric lights to the engine houses of the local and municipal Fire Companies without charge.

That the said John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, shall and will during the maintenance and operation of the said works furnish electric light to consumers on meter rates which shall not exceed one-half cent per hour for each light of 16 candle power, or one cent per hour for each light of 32 candle power, and also furnish power to consumers at rates not exceeding five cents per horse power per hour.

That the said John D Ball and William J Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, shall, before being entitled to the above mentioned power, first pay into the Town treasury a sum of money equal to the costs incurred by the Town in the preparation and publication of this ordinance as well as the one of which this is an amendment.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this ordinance shall take effect immediately.
