This is a stout plank about seven feet long, raised to a height of two feet upon rough hewn logs. The middle of the plank is gripped by a framework rising from the floor to a height of five feet, with three great beams running across it, the whole fastened together with pegs. Upon the plank are laid two rollers, and on these rests a half log of wood just fitting between the sides of the frame. This weight s smooth on its under surface, rough hewn above, and is provided at each end with three pegs which sorve as bandles.
