## Annual Town Meeting.

Called to order at 10.15, Wednesday morning, by Town Clerk O'Donnell. Chas. Woodcut chosen Chairman; J. L. O'Donnell, Secretary.

Minutes of the last annual and two special meetings approved.

Petitions were read, asking for arc lamps at corner of Main and Middle Roads, Main and Fairview, Main at Elvins, Bridges, Twelfth and Chew, Orchard and Railroad Ave., Maple and County Road, Central Ave., near Wm. Bernhouse's residence, Central and Valley Avenue, Second and Cherry, Central and Broadway, Thirteenth and First Road. Letter read from Wm. H. Bernhouse, suggesting a change from arc lights to incandescent could be made in some places. The subject was debated for some time. Mr. Pannocast, of the Electric Light Company, offered five 32-candle power lamps in place of each arc, and stated that the change could be made on the entire length of Central Avenue.

This seemed to meet with general approval, and it was voted to receive all petitions and Mr. B.'s communication, and refer the whole matter to Town Council with favorable recommendation; also, to appropriate \$800 in addition to \$850 on the ballot and \$250 balance unexpended, to pay for the increased number of lights.

Chairman of Council Boyer sent a communication, stating that Mrs. M. B. Sutton desired to buy a strip (one-eighth of an acre) of land, owned by the Town, adjoining the "Cemetery gravel pit." The strip contains no gravel, is of no value to the Town, but would make a desirable outlet from the farm. On motion, referred to Council, with power to sell.

Voted, that salaries of Town officers be the same as last year.

Council asked authority to purchase a gravel bed on Twelfth Street, for \$250. Granted—the money to be taken from appropriation for highways.

Adjourned at 11.15.

**AN ORDINANCE** designating the Streets and Highways in the Town of Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic, State of New Jersey, in which the poles, wires, cables and conduits of the Inter-State Telephone Company shall be placed, and prescribing the manner of placing the same, and regulating the use of the streets and highways by said company.

Introduced Feb. 22, 1902.  
Passed March 7, 1902.

Be it Ordained, by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic, and State of New Jersey:

Section 1. That permission be and is hereby granted to the Inter-State Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, to place and maintain its poles, wires, cables, conduits, and necessary fixtures, for telephone and telegraph purposes, in, through, under, and upon any and all of the streets, alleys, and highways in the Town of Hammonton, and any and all of said streets, alleys, and highways are hereby designated for this purpose; this use and privilege to be restricted as follows: Conduits only shall be used or placed in Bellevue Ave. and Main Road unless otherwise temporarily consented to by a resolution of the Town Council.

Section 14. That a Local commercial exchange shall be established in said Town, and continuously maintained during the continuance of this ordinance.

Section 2. That no pole shall be erected without first obtaining consent in writing of the owner or owners of the soil to the placing of the same.

Section 3. That all poles erected by said company shall be neat, symmetrical, firmly set, and painted for six feet above the surface of the ground, and shall not be less than four feet above the surface of the ground, and shall be so located as in no way to interfere with the safety and convenience of persons traveling on or over the said streets and highways, and to be erected at such a height as the wires strung thereon will clear all trees, and shall be, as far as practicable, located upon the less frequented streets or highways.

Section 4. That all poles erected under this ordinance shall be erected under the supervision of the Highway Committee, and said company shall replace and properly relay any sidewalk or street pavement which may have been displaced or damaged by it in the location of its poles, and leave the same in as good condition as they were before the location of the poles.

Section 5. That three sets of instruments, connected with the main exchange, shall be provided and maintained without expense to the said Town, for the use of the Town and its officers at such places as may be designated by resolution.

Section 6. That sufficient space on the top cross-arm of each pole, or one duct in each conduit, erected or laid under this ordinance, shall be reserved for a wire or wires of any fire alarm or police telegraph system now in use by the Town of Hammonton, or which may at any time hereafter be adopted or used by said Town of Hammonton.

Section 7. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to grant unto the said Inter-State Telephone Company any exclusive right, or to prevent a grant of similar privileges to other companies.

Section 8. That all advertising or printing fees incurred by the Town of Hammonton in connection with the passage of this ordinance, shall be paid by the Inter State Telephone Company.

Section 9. That an acceptable bond in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) shall be filed with the Town Clerk, and kept in force during the continuance of this ordinance for a period of five years, condition to faithfully observe each and all the terms hereof.

Section 10. That this ordinance shall not take effect until after passage, approval, and printing hereof, and when the bond herein provided for has been filed, and a written acceptance hereof lodged with the Town Clerk, and nothing herein shall be construed to confer any privileges until all the terms of this section have been complied with.

**A SUPPLEMENT** to an Ordinance entitled "An ordinance regulating the licensing of Inns and Taverns in the Town of Hammonton," passed August 14th, 1897.

Introduced Feb. 22, 1902.  
Passed March 7, 1902.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, that any keeper of an Inn or Tavern who has procured a license for the sale of intoxicating liquors under the provisions of this ordinance, may conduct an establishment in connection therewith for the purpose of bottling malt liquors and selling the same, after first obtaining the consent of the Town Council, upon the payment of an additional fee of twenty-five dollars annually to the Town Clerk and securing therefrom a certificate of authority from said Clerk authorizing the applicant to conduct a bottling business.

Section 2. Be it ordained, that all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect immediately.
