In the No. 0 of the "South Jersey
Republican," of March 2nd, we read
the following notice:

"Rev. P. H. Monnet, Pastor of the
Italian-Evangelical Church, has re-
signed, and accepted the pastorate of
the Italian Church at Roseto, Penna.
We are sorry to lose Mr. Monnet, but
glad to know that his new charge has
a membership of over one hundred,
and a flourishing Sunday School."

Now, in order to remove any equiv-
ocation, and in order that the public
be not imposed upon, we give notice—

1. That said Mr. Monnet assumed
arbitrarily the title "Rev.," to which
he never was entitled, being a mere
school-master of the primary grade,
and never having been ordained by
any Synod or regular Church or de-
nomination.

2. That his withdrawal and removal
from Hammonton were by no means
spontaneous, but compulsory, on ac-
count of his scandalous attitude to
assuming rights that were not his
own, as a mere temporary missionary
on probation.

3. That, apart an insignificant num-
ber of persons who were moved by a
spirit of contrariness, and who will
soon console themselves of such a loss,
the vast majority salutes with unmiti-
gated satisfaction the removal of such
a man, as the only means to preserve
the fruits of Rev. Th. Fragale's long
and faithful labors in Hammonton.

4. That Mr. Monnet did not receive
a call from Roseto, where nobody
knew of his existence, but he was
admitted provisionally as missionary
on probation for a term of four months
upon the recommendation of some
one who took pity upon him, at his
earnest request.

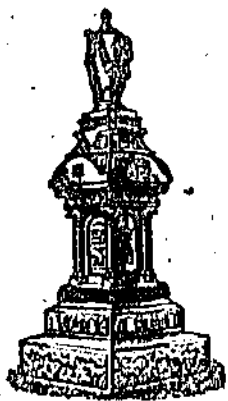

Open Town Meeting.

The annual meeting was held in Jackson's Hall on Wednesday, as advertised. Called to order by Town Clerk J. L. O'Donnell.

P. H. Jacobs was elected Chairman, and J. L. O'Donnell Secretary. The minutes of last meeting, held March 14th, 1900, were read and approved.

Petitions signed by citizens and taxpayers in the several localities were read, asking that electric lights be placed as follows:

At the intersection of Bellevue Avenue and the County Road.
At Central and Bellevue Avenues.
At Egg Harbor Road and Orchard Street, or Second and Orchard.
At County Road and Maple Street.

It was moved that these petitions be granted. Explained by several that this action would necessitate an increased appropriation. Motion amended to refer the matter to the incoming Council. Amendment adopted. Amended motion then laid on the table temporarily, and not afterward taken up.

Communication from M. K. Boyer, Chairman of Council, recommending that the Town Marshal be continued, reciting his good work the past year, and several reasons for his retention; also asking that \$235 be appropriated to purchase new fire hose, which is urgently needed; referring to scarcity of gravel, and asking that some source of supply be provided; further, showing the wisdom of employing a regular Town Solicitor. Communication received and filed.

Appropriations were then in order. For highways, \$2000 were voted; for street lights, \$900; for poor fund, \$500; for fire department, \$300. Total, \$3700.

It was voted that the liquor license money now on hand—\$1050—with other small amounts, aggregating \$1092.20, be placed in the town purpose fund, which, added to \$218.84 unexpended balance, will give \$1311.04 for this year, or \$188.48 less than was expended last year.

A motion to appropriate \$300 for Town Marshal, the same as last year, was voted down with a shout.

Voted, that all town officers shall be paid the same salary as last year. Adjourned at 11:35.
