

#### THE NEW SCHOOL LAW.

The bill now before our State Legislature, revising the School law, contains many praiseworthy new provisions, for example:

It lowers the age of admission to the Kindergarten to four years, a logical consequence of the establishment of Kindergartens, which are specially intended for very young children.

It enables the people of adjoining school districts to establish a union graded school, thus providing a better school than either district would be able to sustain alone.

It provides for evening schools.

A medical inspector may be employed, thus preventing the spread of contagious diseases.

Providing that all school houses shall be constructed with due regard to proper heating, lighting, ventilating, and other hygienic requirements, thus protecting children in the possession of the most precious of all possessions, their health and eyesight.

Establishes a written contract system for the employment of teachers, protecting the latter from unjust or arbitrary dismissal, and preventing unexpected vacancies without a vote of the Board.

This law also carefully preserves all rights heretofore granted to the women, i. e., the right to vote in school meetings on all questions save the election of trustees, and the right to serve as members of the Board of Education.

The bill may be amended in some respects, but will prove advantageous, as a whole, by simplifying some complicated provisions in the old laws, and solving some vexed questions.

The Supreme Court of the State has handed down an opinion in the case of Robert A. Emery vs. A. J. King, in an action of trover, in which a judgment had been rendered against the defendant in the Circuit Court, County Judge A. B. Endicott sitting for the Circuit Judge. The Supreme Court reverses the judgment below, and gives judgment for defendant for costs. K.
