America.

America is the birth place of freedom, liberty and progress, no nation on the globe possesses the advantages for sustaining a free government equal to America. It stands unequalled in the dignity of a republic, shackled neither in religious precepts, monarchical rule, domineering usurpation of lands, propogates public, private and national interests, holds despotism in contempt, and extends the hand of fellowship from shore to shore bidding welcome to foreign humanity. Its institutions of learning are based upon equality, embracing the nations honor truth and integrity, and builds up its national welfare upon principles of virtue and justice. Education is the foundation upon which rests the American Government. It is the wheel upon which progress revolves, and is the great propeller to national greatness. It is the acting-agency between judicial powers, and the overthrow of kingdoms principalities and thrones. The mind is the controlling element, all moral social and political bearings depend upon its use, it builds up modifies and makes anew, and develops progress according to its educational discipline. The dealings with a nation may be likened to an individual, give him a right understanding and he will act accordingly, and in proportion to the cultivation of intellect, will the people introduce and maintain patriotic measures. Whenever the nations power—its diplomatic relations or constitutional amendments are called in question, the intelligence of the people act as a judiciary. Whenever conflicting internal regulations plunging the nation into war, or government inability shaking from its centre the maintenance of national integrity, threatens, it is education that prepares the people to meet these contingencies, intellectually discriminating between right and wrong. Progress demands education, and a nation becomes a succession of progressive steps, each generation learning experience from the former. Educational qualification is the ruling consideration in the selection of rulers, trusting to their ability to judge of national requirements, and to keep the government free from strife mutiny and war, securing peace at home and upon foreign shores, and wherever the broad stripes of liberty wave in the breeze, to carry with it the assurance that all is well. The destruction of a nation depends not so much upon a revolutionary tide as upon the ability of the people to control the agitation and inharmonious with a firm unflinching determination to stand for the right, and pass through struggles to reap the harvest of a greater nationality.

The term education in its literal and practical sense implies *progression, morality, justice, and a recognition of humane principles.* The prosperity and standing of any nation take their rise from this point of understanding, and improve upon present conditions becoming more powerful and self-organized according to the progressive advantages given. Nations like individuals promise steps to their advantage and blot out the incongruities of the past by a higher grade of action, and any abridgement upon this rule of conduct stamps demoralization, and points to an overthrow of that emulation the people have acquired. The voice of many an aspirant to authority and power has faltered, and nations have plunged into the abyss of incarcerated oligarchy through ignorance and a misguided conception of the progressive educational principles which underlie the primitive or elementary conditions necessary to a republican form of government. Thus education declares to the people their only prerogative in sustaining republicanism and their only safeguard against monarchy and despotism. It gives the people more extended views of life, and nationality qualifies them to act judiciously in choosing or rejecting their delegates to office, and keeps the government revolving upon an apex of power, which is the intelligence of the people. This is what has given preeminence to America as a nation, and upon the freedom of this depends its future progress. In no way can America so effectively Americanize foreign emigration, and as propertary to taking part in the government than by compelling them to an understanding of American literature. The people need to bind their peculiarities, to keep them from becoming isolated, mixing the tares with the wheat, and by cultivated one gives place to the other, and where ignorance did once abound there may be a harvest of intelligence. Education then is the only source for mutual benefit, and to that would I invite attention and learn the results to be realized through the office of administrative power.
