Town Council Meeting.

An adjourned meeting was held on Wednesday evening; all members present.

Resolutions were adopted, appointing Mr. Remington surveyor of streets which have been petitioned for, — Peach Street from Central Avenue to Valley, and from Valley Ave. to Liberty Street; Wireman Avenue from Pleasant Street to Fairview.

Both license applications, Pinto and Jacobs, were granted. — Messrs. Austin and Sharpe voting no.

An ordinance was read, from Solicitor, providing that all liquor licenses expire at same time.

The offer of the Civic Club's flat-iron plot was declined, with thanks.

A petition for grading Liberty Street was received, and referred.

Communication received from Board of Health in regard to securing dumping-ground for refuse, — tin cans, ashes, etc., calling attention to the fact that citizens are carting them onto "the other fellow's land," all over town; also asked Town if they will collect rubbish this year. The sentiment seemed to be that individuals should transport their own rubbish, and the Highway Committee was authorized to advertise that a portion of the Twelfth Street gravel pit is to receive such cargoes.

Clerk was instructed to ascertain, through Solicitor, whether there is any law or ordinance forbidding the dumping of rubbish in woods, swamps, roads or vacant lots.

Communication from the Water Commission stated that First Road desires water, requiring 3800 feet of pipe and fire hydrants, at a cost of \$2000; that rents would amount to \$200 per year; and asked for an appropriation for same. As several other profitable extensions are asked for, it was voted to refer the matter to the Fire, Water and Light Committee.

As there are a number of old delinquent water takers, the Water Committee was authorized to ask to see receipts for rents claimed to be paid, or take affidavits of the parties who so claim; or to proceed against them as provided by law.

Finance Committee instructed to draw up a new license ordinance, to incorporate desirable features in the present ordinance and its supplements.

Same committee to draw an ordinance repealing the rebate on four-inch tires.

Rod and Gun Club asked permission to erect a brick building and trap on Park grounds. Left with Property Committee, to investigate and report.

Adjourned at 10.35.

"We spent yesterday in beautiful
Hammonton, the South Jersey rival
of Lakewood. Early in the morning
an old shooting companion
made a small bet that within an
hour he could be within shot-gun
killing distance of a deer. We
drove out, and in the town limits
we sighted a buck and two does.
He advised against walking directly
toward them, and we strolled
leisurely at an angle, as though we
were to pass by. Just as we got to
the nearest point, not over seventy
yards, we stopped, and the buck,
which had been closely looking at
us, gave his shrill snort and all
three whirled and disappeared in
the pines. And this is an example
of the good Jersey law, largely the
work of Assemblyman Elvins. Ten
years close season passed without
a let-up, and now there are only
four days of shooting each year—
the Wednesdays in November,—
with hounds barred. Hammonton
Rod and Gun Club's rooms have
five heads with as fine stacks of
horns as we have seen, all trophies
of last autumn, and killed within
walking distance of the club. Let
the New York state lawmakers
ponder well, and follow this exam-
ple, before they give in to the ad-
vocates of hounding in the Adirond-
acks in the bill now pending."—

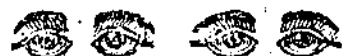

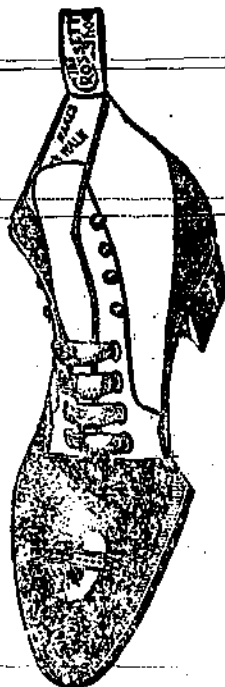
