

Annual School Meeting.

Held on Tuesday afternoon, the meeting was not as numerously attended as anticipated, less than fifty voters being present.

Measrs. Waas, Seely and Osgood were re-elected members of the Board of Education, without opposition.

By unanimous vote, the Board was authorized to build an addition to Rosedale School House, to cost not over \$10,000.

\$2000 were appropriated for building, furnishing and repairs.

\$4500 was authorized for general current expenses.

A resolution, emanating from the Civic Club, introduced and advocated by the ladies, was adopted after considerable debate, instructing the Board to establish manual training in our schools, beginning in September next.

There being no funds available for this purpose, the Board were instructed to secure necessary information and call special meeting of voters to further consider the matter, and make an appropriation for the manual training course, if necessary.

His evening subject will be: "The end of the world as photographed by the Apostle Peter." Special services, preparatory to communion on Easter Sunday, will be held every evening during the week, beginning at 7.30. The public generally are cordially invited. The whole week will be taken up with the study of the Book of Jude, a printed outline of which will be given to everyone who attends.


Brown-Tail Moth Danger.

During the season of 1908 and 1909 brown-tail moths have been unusually abundant in continental Europe, and especially in France. The winter nests, filled with caterpillars, have, therefore, been correspondingly numerous, and have invaded nurseries and plant-growing establishments.

During the winter of 1908-'09 thousands of these nests arrived on nursery stock at the ports of this country, chiefly New York, and the most rigid inspection work was needed to prevent the establishment of these pests in New York, New Jersey and other States where the insect does not yet occur. An attempt was made, during the summer of 1909, to secure the co-operation of the foreign plant-growers in keeping out infected stock; but, so far as France is concerned, with practically no effect. Brown-tail nests with living caterpillars have already been found this season on plant stock recently received, and all gardeners, florists and growers that have ordered stock from abroad are requested to notify Prof. John B. Smith, State Entomologist, New Brunswick, New Jersey, that arrangements may be made for its inspection on arrival.

The establishment of this pest in New Jersey would mean even heavier loss than that inflicted by the San Jose Scale, and would affect more interests, since it feeds on shade as well as orchard trees. The insect is also a direct nuisance to the individual, the poisonous hairs of the caterpillar producing the "brown-tail rash," which is very painful and often difficult to cure.






