Annual School Meeting.

There was a good attendance at the annual meeting, held Tuesday evening, in the Assembly Room.

Dr. Charles Cunningham was elected chairman, and W. K. Seely secretary.

Clerk read minutes of previous meetings; also an excellent report of school finances, improvements, enrollment, etc.

Nominations were opened for members of the Board of Education, and after balloting the result was announced as follows:

W. R. Tilton received 62 votes
Mrs. Harry McD. Little, 57
Andrus E. Holman, 57.

While the above were elected, these came near being a tie:

Mrs. H. K. Spear, 55 votes
Jas. L. White, 45
Edw. E. Johnson, 26.

One hundred and fifty ballots cast. The three resolutions quoted below were adopted by vote of 51, 51 and 51 votes, respectively:

1. RESOLVED, That there be raised by Special District Tax, for Repairing, Altering, and Furnishing School Houses the sum of \$1,000.

3. RESOLVED, That there be raised by Special District Tax, for payment of maturing District Notes, and interest on district notes, the sum of \$3,200.00.

The Board having purchased the Russell Moore tract, and received the deed, the Base Ball Club asked the District to buy the fence and grand stand, fixing the price at the balance due on them, \$323.62, the total value being \$750, and worth \$475 for old lumber. By vote, the Board was requested to make the purchase.

Voted, that Board issue a report up to the end of school year.

Also voted, to hold next meeting in the evening.

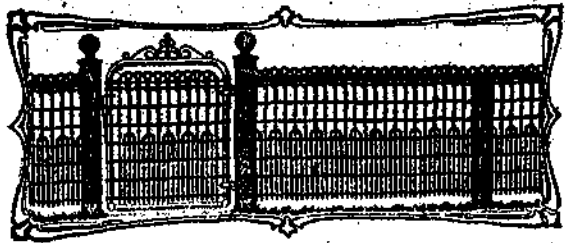

Was it Luck, or Providence?

On the 13th of November, 186— the ship Anglo-Saxon, lumber laden, sailed from Portland Me., for Dublin. The owners, in accepting the model, doubtless valued freight capacity above speed, consequently the vessel was of the square toed type, and never, under the most favorable conditions, exceeded seven knots on a bowline, yet be carrying a bone like a breaker on the harbor bar.

The ship was, as sailors term it, "crank," hence with a good sailing breeze the lee rail was always awash making the task of working ship extremely difficult, and the crew were often on their beam-ends in the lee scuppers.

With variable winds, and all sorts of weather, we finally neared the Irish coast. Owing to thick weather, the captain had been unable to take observation for several days, but judging himself far enough to the eastward, had kept off for St. George's Channel. At eight bells on the morning of the 22nd of Dec., all hands were called to shorten sail. The moon, in the last quarter, had been hidden by clouds for several nights. While stowing the upper fore topsail the clouds split over head and drifted away to leeward like a huge mass of crumpled paper, and to our horror, not three miles away, dead ahead, towered the black cliffs of Mizzen Head. "Boys! There's land," cried one of the crew by my side. High above the roar of the gale rose the shout "Land O!" "Throw off the gasket and come down!" was bellowed from the deck. Well, we did not stop for ratline, but slid down the backstays as fast as our weight would take us, and our hands were warm when we reached the deck.

The topsail was reset, and the ship braced sharp up. Now the struggle for life was on. The lee rail under water, with every yard of canvas the ship could stand up under, she plunged into those huge mountains that pile in from the Atlantic, in a manner, were the danger removed, that would have lent zest to the painters brush.

As we were caught in a bight, the ship was boxhauled for two hours, tacking every ten minutes. Had the vessel mistayed, or anything parted, this story would have never been written, for no earthly power could have saved the ship and crew from wreck and death, save a miracle, and such is not much in evidence on the coast of Ireland.

As daylight broke, a fishing boat was pulled off to us and we hove to. As it gained our lee quarter our captain hailed and asked if there was a pilot on board, whereupon, every man shouted back and answered in a language we could not understand. Then one of our crew, an Irishman, volunteered to act as interpreter. In a twinkling a grizzled old veteran stood up in the boat, and when the end of the main brace was thrown to him he slipped a bowline under his arms and jumped overboard. He was quickly hoisted on board, and running aft, took the wheel, and in half an hour we were at anchor in Bantry Bay.

Sailors as a class, are not much given to prayer. But there were some on board the ship that morning that felt very much like praying had they known how to commence, and I am sure more than one sent aloft a heartfelt thanksgiving when the anchor touched Irish mud.

Some may claim the clouds would have broken away just the same if the ship had been anywhere else on the Atlantic. Quite likely. But suppose they had not? Or, suppose the ship had been a mile further on. The underwriters would have paid the insurance, doubtless.

With the exception of one or two living on the shores of Casco Bay, I feel I am the only one of that crew able to stand his watch and take the trick at the wheel.

I have been shipmates with many different craft, and a few clippers, but for none have I cherished the feeling that I had for the "Anglo Saxon," for the fight she made off Bantry Bay.

Strange as her raiment is, the maiden hath the serene air of one who appeareth to say unto herself:

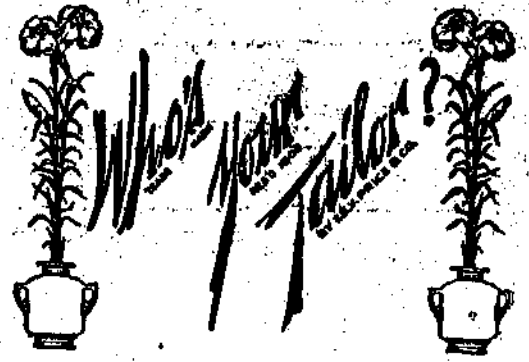
"Verily, I am the observed of all observers: yea, I am the cynosure of all eyes!"
