As the result of an agitation started by Mayor Howe, of Passaic, and augmented by a number of other officials of the city, a new ordinance for the regulation of the liquor traffic was lately introduced in the Common Council there. The proposed law is quite revolutionary in its provisions. It would raise the license fee from \$250 to \$500; would limit the number of saloons to two for every thousand of population; would compel every saloon to close at midnight, and keep their shades down after that hour and all day on Sunday; would prohibit the granting of licenses to places within three hundred feet of each other, or near any church, school, or public



We were sorry to hear that there appears to be little prospect of meet ing the terms required to secure the Skinner & Son cut glass factory as a permanent institution It is estimated that the land and buildings. desired will cost about \$4000. Our Loan Associations are willing to advance the money on satisfactory security. The plan under which the committee is working is as follows: Skinner & Son will maintain five o the twenty shares necessary, and as attempt is being made to have our ousiness men assume the balance,one or more shares each. The secu rity required by the association is personal bond-given by each share holder, to maintain his share until maturity. This bond seems to b the stumbling-block; for, while man may be quite willing to pay the two dollars per month, he hesitates about binding his heirs to keep it up in case of his death. Hence it i feared that the project will result in failure, as but six of the fifteen shares have been taken, and some whos aid has been counted upon do no respond favorably.

It will be a calamity to lose that actory, which would become more aluable to the community each year, judging by the results of the past three years.

We submit a question, and a suggestion. We are told that the Skin er firm are willing, in lieu of main taining five shares; to pay their ful value (\$1000) in cash. This would be one-fourth of the estimated cost the property, -- fully equal to the ecurity-ordinarily-demanded-from private borrowers. Will not the oan association loan the balance \$3000, on fifteen shares, taking first mortgage upon the property? This would relieve stockholders from the necessity of giving their bonds; and aken. Or, if necessary, let the roperty be deeded to the associaion which advances the money, the onveyance being so worded that is shall revert to Skinner & Son when

the loan is repaid. It would seem that new property costing \$4000 ought to be sufficient reinforced by monthly payments and backed by the moral security of the town.

Be it Ordained, by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic, and State of New Jorsey,— Section I. That permission be and is here-by granted to the Inter-State Telephone Com-

psy granted to the Alter-Siste a beginning com-pany, its successors and assigns, to place and maintain its poles, wires, o-bles, conduits, and necessary fixures, for telephone and telegraph purposes, in. through, under, and upon any and all of the streets, alleys, and bighways in the Town of Hammonton, and any and all of said atrosts, alloys, and highways are bereby-designated for this purpose; this use and priv-ilege to be restricted as follows: Conduits only shelt be used or placed in Ballevue Ave. and Maio Road unless otherwise temporarily consented to by a resolution of the Town

Council.
