





The annual meeting of voters Hammonton School District was held on Tuesday afternoon, 19th inst., in the assembly room, Central School House.

Called to order at 3:04 p.m., by D. S. Cunningham, District Clerk Orville E. Hoyt was elected Chairman; D. S. Cunningham, Secretary After the call for the meeting had been read, the minutes of the last

annual meeting were approved. The Board of Education had dis tributed printed copies of their annual report, and on motion, these were accepted.

Nominations were then made for Trustees for three years,-Messrs Thos. C. Elvins, C. F. Osgood and Dr. J. A. Wans, to succeed them selves; Mrs. Kirk Spear for two years, to succeed Miss-Anna-Pressey, At RAINER'S. esigned. The polls were kept oper one hour, and the four nominee declared elected.

During the hour, business pro eeded. The first proposition submitted by the Board, to purchase certain lots for a play-ground, was on motion of Mr. Adams, laid on the table without discussion.

The next, to build an iron bridge to connect the two Central buildings to serve as a fire escape from either was the cause of long and earnest debate;-but-the-Board-were-author ized to make the improvement, at a cost not to exceed \$300.

The third proposition was to build school house near Thirteenth St. and First Road, to cost not over \$1200. 'An explanation of the need or this additional accommodation was made, and the necessary authority given for its construction.

The Board virtually withdrew its for the Primary Department, and this was laid on the table.

The appropriations for maintaining the schools came next. The Board asked \$3000 for teachers' salaries but as it had been decided not t provide an additional room, and the employment of another teacher would not be necessary, they consented to a reduction of \$360, and the meeting

For repairs and refurnishing, the oard asked \$600, but voluntaril educed the amount to \$400, which

For books and supplies, \$500 were

The Board wanted \$1400 for jani ors, materials, etc., but dropped 3100 from their estimate, and the eeting dropped a like sum, voting

The total amount of the Board's estimates was \$6075; amount actual y appropriated, \$5315,—or \$345 less






