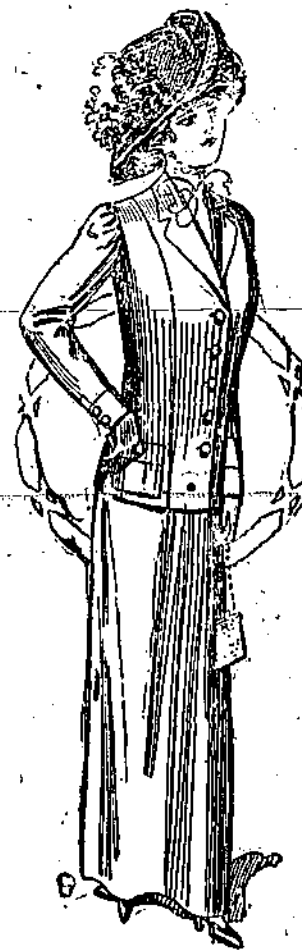

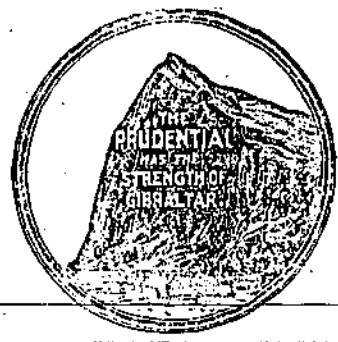

Annual School Meeting.

Called to order by the District Clerk, W. R. Seely, on Tuesday, March 21st, at 3:05 p. m., in the Assembly Room, High School. Charles Woodcut was elected Chairman; W. R. Seely, Sec'y. Call for the meeting was read; also minutes of last annual meeting were read; also of special meetings on May 14th and July 9th, 1910, which were approved.

The annual report was accepted, in printed form. Messrs. W. R. Tilton and Robert Steel, and Mrs. H. McD. Little were re-nominated for members of the Board of Education. Wm. H. Parkhurst was also named, but declined. Rolls were kept open one hour, and tellers reported 24 ballots cast.—Mr. Tilton receiving 24 votes; Mr. Steel, 23; and Mrs. Little, 2.

Resolutions were introduced, authorizing the raising, by District tax, the following amounts:

For purchase of land, \$25; for repairing and furnishing buildings, \$1500; current expenses, \$4000; manual training, \$200; payment of principal and interest on District note, \$1305.57. Total, \$7630.57.

Ballot was taken, 26 votes cast, all in favor of the appropriations. A resolution was unanimously adopted, authorizing the Board to sell to the highest bidder the buildings on the Tilton-Del'uy property, bought last year, and to use the proceeds to improve the lots.

A resolution was also adopted, "as the sense of this meeting," that all school money should be deposited equally in the Peoples Bank and Hammon Trust Co., if the Board of Education finds this movement legal.

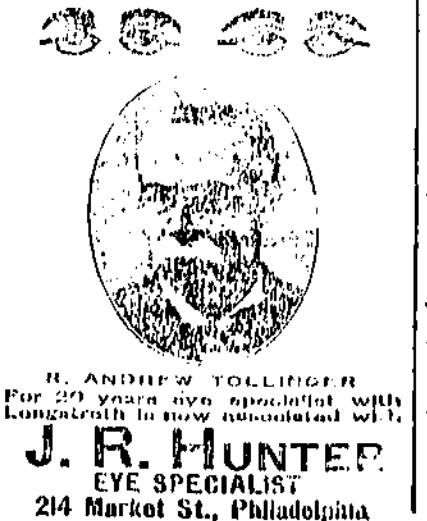
The Board was authorized to purchase from the Town the lot adjoining Rosedale school house, for \$25.

Adjourned at 4:45.

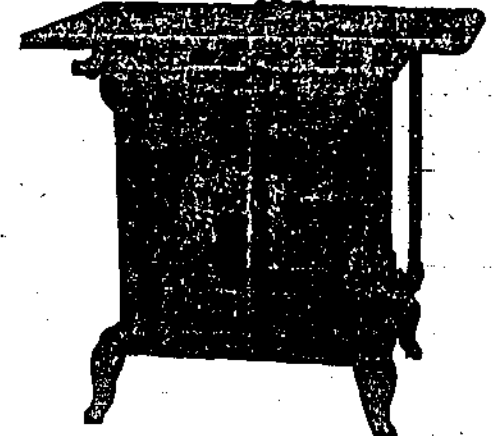
