Fire Alarms

About 12.30, last Sunday afternoon, both Fire Companies (and hundreds of others) were called to the barn of "No. 45," beyond the Union. Fire had broken out in the barn, the loft of which was filled with hay, which required hard fighting and tons of water through twelve hundred feet of hose. The first story of the barn was saved, and much of the hay.

The second fire occurred at 7.40, Monday evening, in Watkie & Nicholson's propagating house. Mice and matches are supposed to have been the cause. Fire had broken out near the water spigot, burning the hose completely off, and in attaching a new hose, Mr. Watkie burned his right hand severely. His own outfit put out the blaze, and left no work for the fire ladders. About \$70 will cover the loss on stock - Easter plants and flowers.

The third alarm, up to time of going to press, had not taken place.

No one should ride on the fire apparatus or teams hauling same, excepting members, and had the men police authority, this could be insisted on.

The Liquor-Business

We mentioned that deplorable circumstance of five young men intoxicated on a Sunday afternoon, and wondered where they obtained the liquor.

A few hours after the paper was mailed, a lady called us on the telephone and said: "Those young men were seen on that day, at a place, on the road to Nassau, not these only, but many more, any day, and they had there drink in plenty."

Supposing that this was news, we mentioned it to a member of Council. To our surprise, he said: "Oh, yes, that has been well-known for a long time. We have been endeavoring to secure evidence against the party, but in vain. They are very smart, and detectives cannot do a thing with them. We know of two other places in another part of town, and have hired men to obtain necessary evidence, but they failed."

Now, isn't that a business to be proud of? A trade that flourishes in spite of a score of laws to prevent it; that inspires men with a keen smartness that will defeat the brightest of detectives; that will hide in the dark and flourish despite every attempt to crush; that makes men lie without blushing; that respects neither human nor divine authority, and defies both.

When Hammoncton voters decided to legalize "lows and taverns," it was promised that men who paid for licenses to sell rum would crush out speak-easies; being financially interested, they would naturally resent competition that cost the competitor nothing, and eagerly do their best to prevent it. But not one more has been made by licensed men to aid in suppressing illegal sales.

The whole business is too disgusting for words; and these Sunday revels destructive of body, mind and soul, for the sake of a few dimes, luring men to buy that which snuffs him for home or heaven.

Isn't this a business to take pride in? Do you crave the responsibility for legalizing it?

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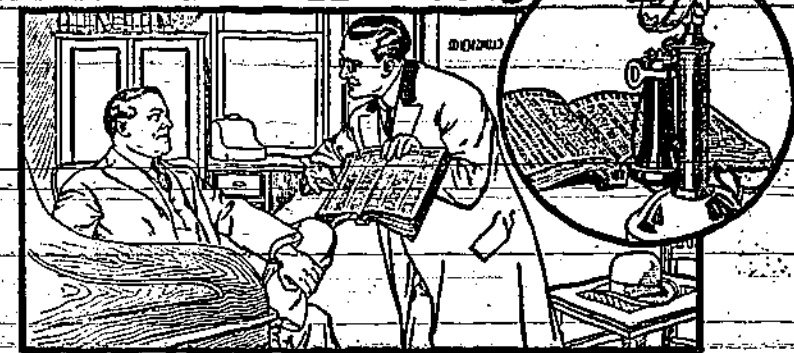

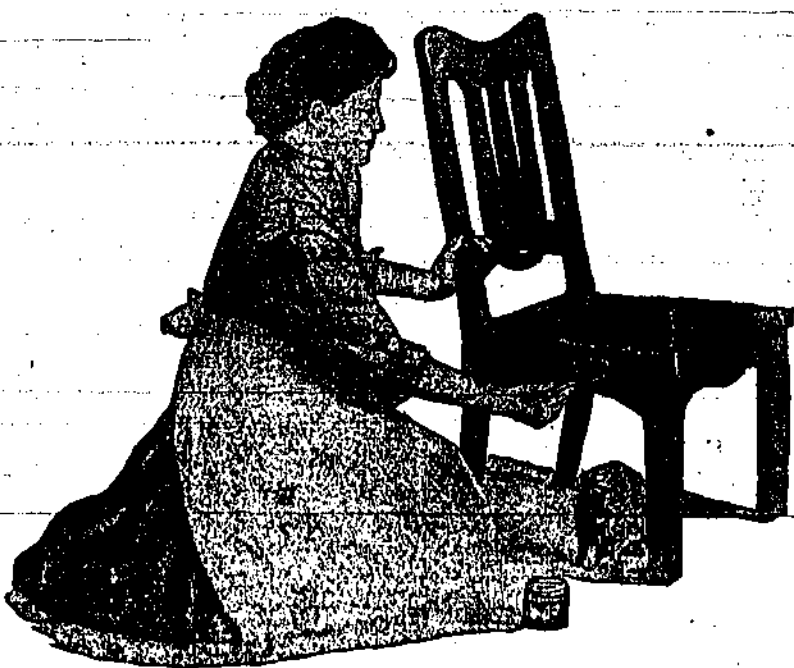
