Now only are the law and order people in favor of the new ordinance that was before the Common Council last week, in Passaic, but it has the endorsement of the liquor dealers association; but the brewers, who own nearly one-half of the 138 saloons in Pessaic, are solidly arrayed against the proposed change, which would reduce the number of saloons to about sixty.

The bitter contest which is certain to develop when the ordinance makes its appearance in the Council, will be watched with interest in other cities as well as Passaic.

The brewing interests in all the large municipalities of New Jersey are the largest factors in the liquor regulation problem which the authorities must solve.

Section 3. That all poles erected by said company shall be peat, symmetrical, firmly set, and painted for six feet apove the surface of the ground, and shall not be less than feet above the surface of the ground, and
