





THE FUR SEAL.

NTIL quite recently the fur seal was regarded as a mere variety of the hair-seal, which abounds in the North Atlantic, and is not usknown even on the shore of Scotland. But within late years it has been found that the two animals are quite unlike, and some facts about the more valuable of the

two may be interesting.

The fur-seal formerly abounded in the Southern hemisphere, on the borders of the Antarctic Circle, but reckless killing has well-nigh exterminated it there, so that now it scarcely exists anywhere but in the North Pacific Ocean, in the Alaska Territory. and even there its range is confined to four small islands in the very heart of Behring Sea, though fax nent ice-floes, and thus to escape the ravages of the polar bears.

In these islands the fur-seals have collected in the breedin gaeason for countless ages, undisturbed by man or beast, till the Russians first broke in upon their preserves. Since then they have been the objects of constant attention and pursuit.

The male fur-seal when full grown measures nearly seven feet from snout to tail, and weighs between four and five hundred pounds. He has a small head, with a muzzle and jaws not unlike those of a Newfoundland dog. with beautiful eyes very expressive

On the upper lip he has a long mustache of grayish bristles, often long enough to extend over his shoulders. He swims with his head high over the water, and on land walks with head erect.

When alarmed he can run for a short distance nearly as fast as a man. There are three toes on the hind feet, but the fore-flippers are mere fingeriess bands. The female is smaller than her mate, and her eyes even more beautiful. She is very gentle, never quarreling with her neighbors, as her mate is very much inclined to do. Indeed, the battles between the male seals are very serious, the fur is sent flying in all directions, they seize each other with their teeth. while the eyes gleam with angry fire -all this agitation being displayed in order to secure a suitable place of

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
