The first meeting of the new Council was held on Monday evening last, March 26th. Present, Messrs. Boyer, Batchelor, DePuy, Holman, and Watkins. Called to order by Town Clerk at 8:12.

M. K. Boyer was unanimously elected Chairman for the year. The new Chairman's inaugural address was short, but practical,—"Call the roll."

The Fire, Water and Light Committee reported that the Electric Light Co. have ordered twenty-five latest improved lamps for street lighting, which will probably be in use in about three weeks.

Fire Companies nominated Chas. W. Austin for Fire Chief.

Matteo D'Agostino applied for renewal of his liquor license.

Chairman called for nominations, to fill vacancy in Council caused by death of Mr. Sutton. No names proposed—hence no action.

Chairman appointed the following standing committees:

Highways, Watkins, Holman, and (the new member—not yet chosen).  
Law and Order, Batchelor, DePuy, and Watkins.

Fire, Water and Lights, Batchelor, (Blank), and DePuy.  
Finance, (Blank), Holman, and DePuy.

License, DePuy, Chairman, and all members of Council.

Messrs. R. D. Bickford and E. A. Joslyn were then nominated for Overseer of Highways. Ballot was taken, with this result: Joslyn, 3 votes; Bickford, 2 votes. Mr. Batchelor offered the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously:

Resolved, that Elias A. Joslyn having received the higher number of votes, he is declared elected Overseer of Highways until next annual election.

Jon. H. Garton was elected Night Marshal for one year.

Geo. W. Swank, Jr., was elected Town Marshal for one year.

Messrs. Eli H. Chandler and Matthew Jefferson were nominated for Collector

for one year. The ballot gave Mr. Jefferson three votes, Mr. Chandler two votes. Mr. J. declared elected.

Chas. W. Austin was confirmed as Fire Chief for one year.

Bonds were tendered by Collector and Treasurer Davis (\$10,000), and Constables Bernshouse, Combs and Shackley (\$200 each). All referred to Finance Committee.

Applications for a renewal of license from Matt. D'Agostino, and transfer from J. T. French to E. T. Crowley, referred to License Committee.

An ordinance was introduced and passed first reading to require a license from bottlers and bottlers' agents selling in Town; fee, \$150.

An ordinance to amend the Electric Light ordinance also passed first reading.

Voted, that Electric Light Company be asked to pay for publication of their enabling ordinance.

Voted, that regular meetings of Council be held on the last Saturday evening of each month, at eight o'clock.

Gakdale Cemetery Association granted sufficient gravel to cover their major avenues.

Property Committee instructed to have Council room and lock-up thoroughly cleaned and renovated.

On motion, adjourned to meet at the call of the Chairman.
