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From the Toledo Blade. Mr. Nasby Dreams. The Democratic Future Unveiled.

The site that McCreery, of Kentucky, introduced his resolution rescoring the Arlington estate to the Lee family, and as pervading for the diggin up of the bodies of the federal soldiers which were buried there, I went to sleep full of that idea. In my dream, my mind o'erleaped two years. I found myself standing in the federal cemetery at Arlington, on the ground made classical by it wuz hev in been owned by Gen. Lee. "Wat does this mean?" I askt the confederate officer who seem'd to hev charge of the proceedings.

"Mean!" he returned; "it means that at last the era of feelin hez returned. It means that at last the democracy is in power, and that the proper equilibrium hez been restored."

"Wat year is this?" I asked in astonishment.

"1873. The clockshun last fall made Hoffman President, and the Congress is Democratic likewise. Hoffman wuz inaugurated day before yesterday, and we wuz wuzn't commint recon-struction, a cordia to our ilice."

"Wat is the program?" I asked.

McCreery immediatly interdeed of the same resolution which was defeated in 1870, givin back the Arlington estate to the Lee fam'l and removin the federal sojers from the grounds, that the site there of wite not offend the youthfol Lees. The South wuz it satisfied. I wuz good emif ez fur ez it went, but they wantid suthin more. They wantid an acknowlidge-ment that them ded sojers never shooid hev bin there, and they demandid that the acknowledgement be made in such a way that it would be understood, that it wuz an analogy. Salsbury of Delaware got the idea. Immediatly he moved to amogd the resolution, providin that the work of removin the ded sojers and restorin the grounds be performed by veteran federal sojers selected from all the regiments in the servis, ez a slight token of the regret of the government for hev in desecrated the property, which wuz promptly passed. To further soothe the Southern mind, a hundred confidit officers wuz requested to take command of the men and superintend the work, and—

At this moment one of the Federals came up and salot'd the officers who wuz a talking with me.

"We hev the wagons loaded with skeletons—wat shal we do with em?"

"Dump em into the Potomac—dump em into the Potomac, where the current will wash em out to sea."

"But wat d'as to be done?" said I.

"Not much. The work of consiliashun is going on. A bill is pendin pervidin for the removal of the dead bodies of federal sojers from all the cemeteries in the country and the destruction of all the tomb stuns and the monument erected on em. The names of the battles to be changed, so that all memry of the unpleasantness shall be obliterated. The vessels which took part in the war is to be sunk, and their names taken off the records of the Navy Department; to make the government truly nashunal, ez it wuz, the South is to hev complete control of the government in all its departments, and is to dictate its policy in everything. All the battle-flags, guns, and trophies of all kinds is to be taken out of the Nashunal and State Capitols; celebrashuns and reunions of federal regiments is to be prohibited, and it is to be made a penal offense to even mention the name of any one of the battles which took place between the years 1861 and 1865, and all them which lost their lorcshuns with the Confederacy, and who lost property in consequence, is to hev it restored, when practicable, or the value in money, which the most uv em take, ez the most uv em prefer livin in New York. The Cabinet is now made up of Southern men, and to remunerate em for wat they have suffered—they are all men who had communs in the Confederate army. I go myself to-morrow to remove the bodies from the Cemetery at Gettysburg, and to destroy the Federal asylums for sojers at Dayton, Ohio, and Augusta, Maine. We did hev some trouble. The moment we commenced takin of restorin estates to confederates, and removin em for lost property, then come some thousands of Southerners whose property had bin yosued by the Federal Government, who demandid remuneration likewise, but they didn't ask a second time. The proposition wuz received with shouts of lusture by every Democrat in Congress."

"McCreery then in 1870—"

"Was simply two years ahead of his time, that wuz all. When the Republican party lost its grip in 1871, we knowd we had em. We had McCreery, and such as he, steadily, till after the clockshun gave us the power."

At this point I awoke and realized that wat I had extere c'd wuz merely the baseless fabric of a dream. Let the Democrats once get into power, and we shal see wat we shal see. There is olden times—there is remonstration to be made—there is restitution. We shal gend now hev we lost our memry. Let that dream relat to the success of Democracy could be true, the rest of it wuz a quick emif.
