A few weeks ago, a meeting was held in the Council chamber, to consider the matter of advertising Hammonton as a health resort. While not large, the meeting was decidedly and unanimously in favor of such a course. A temporary organization was effected and three committees appointed, viz: one, composed of the physicians of the he had made, town, to prepare an article for publication in medical journals, setting forth the advantages of Hammonton as a place of residence for invalids; 2nd, a finance committee, to canvass the town for funds; and, 3rd, a committee on publication.

These committees have not been idle. The physicians have their first article ready, and a medical journal of wide-circulation has agreed to give it space in its columns. The finance committee are at work, and meeting with gratifying success.

It is proposed to issue an illustrated pamphlet or booklet, with some of the finest views in and around Hammonton, such as Lake and street views, handsome houses, etc., on one page, and on opposite pagesuch information as will interest proposed visitors. The committee on publication, having this and kindred matters in charge, are getting estimates of probable cost, and will have some interesting matter to renort.

In the near future, it is proposed to call a public meeting; and as all our business men, and in fact all citizens, are interested in the success of this movement, it is hoped that the meeting will be very fully attended. It is hoped to then form a permanent organization, with appropriate and necessary committees appointed, and the work fairly launched Its ultimate success depends largely on the attitude of physicians, and our local medicos have already received letters from physicians in New York and Philada, highly commending the move, and expressing a wish to co-operate with us as soon as we get things in working order.

It is probable that a delegation of prominent physicians will visit Hammonton this Spring, for the purpose of seeing what advantages we possess for the class of patients they are treating. In fact, one New York doctor has already been making inquiries about coming and bringing a few other medical men with him.

Let all the citizens of Hammonton turn out to the meeting, elect good and sultable men for officers, and give the movement half the support, financially and otherwise, that they have to several other projects for the benefit of the town, and the result will be much more satisfactory.


