Our New England Correspondence.

WORCESTER, March 27th, 1871.

Mr. Editor.—In looking over your issue of Feb. 25th, I was agreeably surprised at the success achieved by your composition in "the pursuit of knowledge under difficulties," as I found my communication correctly rendered without even a typographical error or a misplaced punctuation point. I must confess that I had some misgivings lest your familiar spirit, vulgarly called "printer's devil," might be obliged to pass into the abnormal or superior state in order to decipher my somewhat illegible manuscript; but as you make no mention of such a necessity I conclude it did not occur.

I think that I have some little appreciation of the unfortunate position of a newspaper reporter who is expected to furnish a certain amount of sensation items for his particular department, when from some unexplained cause the whole machinery of society is moving so smoothly and quietly that there is absolutely nothing to chronicle. So now, when I have undertaken to inform you and your readers of the events that transpire in this locality there seems to be all at once a perfect social stagnation. No murders—no burglaries—no riots—no elopements—no railroad collisions—no gas explosions—in short, we seem to be passing through one of those peculiar periods in which nothing happens.

"Nothing happens!" and yet all about us humanity is working out the great problem of life, in all its various phases. Through joy and sorrow, through sunshine and shadow, human souls are moving onward to their destiny, wrestling with temptations where victory would yield them armor of proof for future conflicts, or where defeat would place them beyond the Rubicon of virtue and respectability. "Nothing happens!" and yet, if some modern Asmodeus could unroll these stately mansions, and read the secret history of their inmates, he might witness dramas whose power and pathos would far exceed what we behold upon the stage of a theatre, and his revelations might perchance convince us that the wildest imaginings of the novelist are sometimes eclipsed by the romance of real life.

"Nothing happens!" and yet, those great mysteries birth and death are daily transpiring around us, and we know as little of the conditions by which they are surrounded as of the results which they will produce. How can we say that "nothing happens," when the merest trifles are sometimes fraught with the power to produce the mightiest issues. We pass along the crowded street, are jostled against some passing stranger, and make perhaps a hasty apology, or perchance we cast a careless glance at some unfamiliar countenance and pass on unheeding, and no subtle intuition reveals to us how closely that individual may be identified with our future, no gift of prescience warns us that that stranger whom we passed so hastily, holds in hand the thread which in the tangled web of human life will be woven into our destiny.

"Nothing happens!" and yet, the turning point of a whole life sometimes hangs upon the most apparently unimportant incident, and the fate of a community is often affected by the most insignificant circumstance.

It is said that we New Englanders, and especially those who live in the vicinity of the "Hub," are somewhat given to boasting, and we feel as though the weather with which we have been favored for several months past, would justify us in indulging in our special gift. Not only have we had a genuine Jersey winter, but I have never, even in that locality, known such a delightful March as we are enjoying. My windows overlook a park, and for several mornings I have been awakened by a perfect chorus from the birds who make their headquarters there, and crouches and pantries are showing their bright faces in defiance of the almanac and former precedent. Whether April will profit by the good example of her predecessor, and give us another chapter of the same subject continued, is yet an open question.

While the women in this vicinity have been trying to persuade the law makers to give them their rights, it seems that our Hammonton sisters have been quietly taking theirs. When I read your paper which contained the account of that demonstration, I said "Bravo for the Hammonton ladies!" and many to whom I have shown the article with great gusto, have reiterated the expression. I have always had great faith in Hammonton, as well as great love for it, and I am truly glad that so much is being done to justify it. I believe, as I always have, that all things considered, Hammonton is, to say the least, one of the most desirable residences to be found in the U. S. By the way, Mr. Editor, why not give us the names of the IMMORTAL FIFTEEN.
