Diphtheria and Physicians.

One of the most important matters
connected with official duties is that of
preventing the spread of disease. We
have been negligent as a community
because of immunity heretofore; but a
child of Frank Passalacqua was buried
on Monday, and from that case the
disease may spread. That day, both
the father and brother of the lad came
to my house, and they were on the
streets, going where they wished. The
physician states that he ordered that no
one go into the room where the sick boy
was, but on his next visit found the
room full of people.

Messrs. Ballard and Sutton, of the
Board of Health, when notified, at once
went to work, taking such measures as
the law allows; and at their request I
accompanied them on a visit to the
clergyman of the Catholic Church, who
assured us that he would allow no pub-
lic funeral where death resulted from
diphtheria, and volunteered to explain
to his parishioners the importance of
keeping away from houses containing
such cases.

Physicians can do much if they will.
Up to Monday at noon, no precautions
had been taken to disinfect the Passa-
acqua house, or quarantine it, and mem-
bers of the family went and came, and
while preparations were being made for
a funeral friends came at will. The
physician in charge stated that he had
"reported the case" on Saturday, but
nothing was done until about 11 o'clock
on Monday, when I notified members of
the Board. In praise of Mr. Ballard I
will mention that he dropped his tools
and quit work to do his duty.

Some of the children of Main Road
school attended the funeral, and proba-
bly admitted to the room containing
the body before Mr. Ballard reached
the house. John, another son, stopped
at the school house on his way to the
cemetery, and chatted with the boys
who were outside. Such are the people
with whom our physicians must deal,
and they cannot be too careful to keep
keep close watch until the authorities
can act. If necessary, the doctor ought
to remain with his patient and send for
some member of the Board of Health.
The law gives the Board almost unlim-
ited power.

There is a supposition that the phy-
sician who is Health Inspector must see
to these matters, that he is really the
Board of Health, and all that is neces-
sary is to report to him. The fact is,
he is only the Inspector, and has noth-
ing to do with the duties of the Board.
Physicians should notify the President
or Clerk of the Board, or the Town
Clerk, or some member of the Board if
they cannot find the officials, and they
should do so on the first appearance of
the disease. If they fail to do this,
they may find that they have made a
serious mistake.

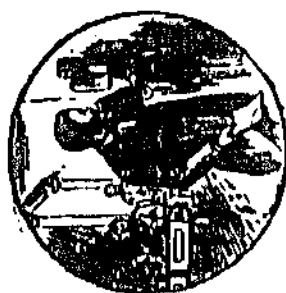
