That the complainants may in any bill it obannery prey that the defendant answer without oath, in which case the answer need not be sworn to, and the allegations and statements thereby, whether rejeonstree or net, sizin not be evidence against the complainant, except on a motion to grant or discovered in a migration of the statements and decisis in an answer duly sworn to, shall have the same effect as heretofore; and when an answer without oath is so prayed, the complainant may annex to the bill interrogatories, founded on statements in the bill, and the same or any part thereof may be addressed to all or any of the defendant, indicate the defendant to whom such interrogatories are addressed, shall answer the same, under oath or affirmation, fully, directly and reponsively, confining the surverse to the intercogatory pronounds and such answers.

CONCRETE.—In presenting the following remarks respecting the nature and uses of the subject of this article, we are conscious of the fact that to many we impart nothing new, but the mass of our readers are doubt less ignorant of its many desirable and durable qualities as a building material. Concrete, for centuries, in some form, has been generally used, mostly as a cament for antiting stone, brick, etc., in sing solid mass or wall and in no instance, when properly made, has it been known to fail. The structures of the ancients bear witness that the concrete portion of their work sphilit the least signs of decay. It is a well established fact that a chemical action is produced by she fusion of silicate (pure sand) with lime, that forms a cement that the elements continue to harden as the years roll on.—The objection to its use as a building material heretofore has been the difficulty encountered in getting it in a practical form.

Mears. Editors of the Chicago Tribune,
GENTLEMEN: Having been consulted in regard to the use of concrete for building purposes, I take this occasion briefly to express my opinion upon the subject. The real value of concrete for such purposes, has been proved by lang experience, both in ancient and modern times. It has been found to possess in a high degree, the propose of hardness and durability; though soft and friable when first formed, it gradually and continually solidifies until it becomes of great hardness. This effect is due to the chemical reactions and combinations, which take place slowly among its constituent particles, a ded by the action of atmospheric agencies. Hence exposure instead of injuring actually henefits it, considering its other valuable properties, as for instance: Its economy, its readiness of preparation on the spot, its admitting of being plastered upon directly, for inside or outside finish, without the use of wood, thereby securing greater safety from five or vermine, its capability of being colored readily to suit the taste. It is surprising that it has not been more extensively used for building purposes, especially in localities where sand and graved are abundant, and other material scarce or expensive. It is, for instance, admirably adapted for basements, basement floors, foundations, and for sewers in dample locations—using in such cases of course, water lime instead of common lime.



Requisites for Graduation.—The requisites for

graduation are three sessions of lectures, and three years' study; or four sessions, including two years spent at the University.

The System of Nedicine Taught.-The University is a liberal medical school, in which all branches of medicine and surgery are taught, including the preparatory studies, without regard to any sociarian views. Hence, while they depre-cate the exclusiveness of Allopathy, Homopathy, Relacticism, Hydropathy, etc., they believe that all principles of ouro and therapentical agents should be taught in all well-regulated medical schools, and that every infelligent, honest, and thorough practitioner is entitled to all the course sles and privileges of the profession, without regard to his poculiar notions in therapouties.

Fecs.-The fees for all branches, including all the tickets, matriculation, and dissection, are: \$60 a session, or \$120 a year. Those who purchase tickets only have to matriculate once, which makes the second session \$55, including domonsitutor's fees, or \$175-for a full course. To aid young men of moderate means, the University has issued five hundred scholarships, which are sold to first course students for \$75, and to second-course students and elergymen for \$50, each constituting the holder a life member, with the perpetual privileges of the lectures, and al the teachings of the school. The only additional fees are a yearly dissecting and matriculating ticket, each

The Advantages of Scholarships .- The studen olding a scholarship can enter the College at any time during the year, attend as long as he chooses, and re-enter the Issuitation as frequently as desired.

It requires no previous reading or study to enter the University on Scholarships; hence all private tuition fees are saved. Students, by holding scholarships, can prose-

In case a student should hold a scholarship and not be able to attend lectures, it can be trans-

ferred to another, thus preventing any Just. Parente, guardians or friends of students wishing to purchase scholarships for them a year of more before their attendance at the University, can secure them by paying one-half the price and paying the balance when the student enters. Physicians and benevolent men can bestow great henefit upon poor young men, by presenting them a scholarship, and thus enabling them to obtain an honorable profession.
