Why Kipling Declared for Prohibition.
In the heart of Buffalo there stands a magnificent building which the population do innocently style a music hall. Everybody comes here of an evening to sit around the little tables and listen to a first-class orchestra. Here I went with a friend—poor or poor is the man who cannot pick up a friend for a season in America—and here were shown the really smart folk of the city.

One night of the evening was a horror. The little tragedy played itself out at a neighboring table, where two very young men and two very young women were seated. It did not strike me until far into the evening that the pimply young reprobates were making the girls drunk. They gave them red wine and then white, and their voices rose with the maiden cheeks' flushes. I watched, and the youths drank till their speech thickened, their eyeballs grew watery. It was sickening to see, because I knew what was going to happen. My friend eyed the group and said:

Maybe they're children of respectable people. I hardly think that, though, or they wouldn't be allowed out with no better escort than those boys. And yet the place is one where everybody comes, as you see. They may be immoralities—but in that case they would not be so hopelessly overcome with two or three glasses of wine. They may be

But whatever they were, they got intolerably drunk—there in that lovely hall, surrounded by the best of Buffalo society. One could do nothing except invoke the judgment of Heaven on the two boys, themselves half sick with liquor.

At the close of the musical performance the quipster maiden laughed vacantly and protested she could not keep her feet. The four linked arms, and, staggering, flickered out into the street—drunk, gentlemen and ladies, as Davy's swine—drunk as lords. They disappeared down a side avenue, but I could hear their laughter until long after they were out of sight. And they were all children of 16 or 17!

Then, recanting previous opinions, I became a Prohibitionist. Better it is that a man should go without his beer in public places and content himself with swearing at the narrow-mindedness of the majority; better it is to poison the inside with very vile temperance drinks, and to buy lager fervently at back doors, than to bring temptation to the lips of young fools, such as the four I had seen. I understand now why the preacher rags against drink. I have said: "There is no harm in it, taken moderately." And yet my own demand for beer helped directly to send those two girls reeling down the dark street to—God alone knows to what end. If liquor is worth drinking, it is worth taking a little trouble to come at—such trouble as a man will undergo to compass his own desires. It is not good that we shall let it lie before the eyes of children, and I have been a fool in writing to the contrary. — From American Notes, by Rudyard Kipling.

SUPPLEMENT to an Ordinance entitled "An ordinance regulating the licensing of inns and taverns in the Town of Hammonton for the sale of liquor," passed Aug. 14th, 1897. Introduced March 30, 1900. Passed April 6, 1900.

1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, that hereafter it shall be lawful for the Board of Councilmen to transfer any license granted by them under and by virtue of the provisions of the ordinance to which this is a supplement, from person to person or place to place within the limits of the said Town of Hammonton.

Provided, however, that the applicant for such transfer shall file a written notice with the Town Clerk of a notice of his intention of such proposed application; at least five days before the time of making such application; and in case of transfer, the license so transferred shall be good only for the unexpired term thereof. AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance granting to John D. Ball and William J. Sheets and their associates and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, full power to use certain public roads, highways, streets, avenues and alleys in the Town of Hammonton for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating works for the supply and distribution of electricity for electric lights, heat or power in said Town of Hammonton." Introduced March 26, 1900. Passed April 3, 1900. Be it enacted by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton:

Section 1. That the last paragraph of Section 2 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance granting to John D. Ball and William J. Sheets and their associates, and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey, their successors and assigns, full power to use certain public roads, highways, streets, avenues, and alleys in the Town of Hammonton, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating works for the supply and distribution of electricity for electric lights, heat or power, in said Town of Hammonton," be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

That the said John D. Ball and William J. Sheets and their associates, and such incorporated company as they may form under the laws of the State of New Jersey shall and will during the maintenance and operation of the said works furnish electric light to consumers on meter rates which shall not exceed three-fourths of a cent per hour for each light of 16 candle power, or one and one-half cents per hour for each light of 32 candle power, and also furnish power to consumers at rates not exceeding ten cents per horse power per hour.

Sec. 2. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage. MICHAEL K. BOYER, Chairman. J. L. O'DONNELL, Town Clerk. Pr. fee, \$4.20

AN ORDINANCE to license Hot-Drinks and Bottlers Agents.

Introduced Mar 26, 1900. Passed April 6, 1900. Be it enacted by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton:

Section 1. That all persons, firms and corporations engaged in the business of bottling wines, beers, and malt liquors within the limits of the Town of Hammonton shall pay to the Collector of said Town an annual license fee of one hundred and fifty dollars for the privilege of bottling and selling such drinks within the said Town.

Sec. 2. That no person, firm or corporation doing a bottling business within the said Town or selling their wares and merchandise there, shall be permitted to sell any of the said drinks, wine, or beer in bulk in less quantities than one quart, nor greater quantities than five gallons, nor in less quantities than twelve bottles, nor to be drunk on or about the premises.

Sec. 3. That for each conviction for a violation of this ordinance the offender shall be fined not to exceed ten dollars, or imprisoned for a period not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 4. That this ordinance shall be in force and take effect immediately after the date of its passage. MICHAEL K. BOYER, Chairman. J. L. O'DONNELL, Town Clerk. Pr. fee, \$2.55
