A N ORDINANCE relating to the Board of Health of the Town of Hammon ton.

Introduced March 27, 1899.
Passed March 30, 1899.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Town Council
of the Town of Hammon ton, That there shall
be in and for this Town a Board of Health in
accordance with "An Act to establish in this
State boards of health and a bureau of vital
statistics, and to define their respective powers
and duties," approved March 31st, 1897, and
the several supplements thereto.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That the said
Board of Health shall consist of seven mem-
bers, and that John T. French, M. L. Jackson,
J. C. Anderson, Wm Cunningham, George
Bernshouse, Jos. H. Garton, and Dr. Charles
Cunningham are hereby appointed to consti-
tute the said Board of Health of this Town;
that Dr. Charles Cunningham shall hold said
office for one year; that George Bernshouse
and that Joseph H. Garton shall hold the said
office for two years; that John C. Anderson
and that William Cunningham shall hold said
office for three years; and that John T. French
and that Marcus L. Jackson shall hold said
office for four years. All members of said
Board hereafter appointed shall hold said office
for four years, except in case of vacancies;
vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That said Board
of Health shall adopt rules and regulations for
its own government, and shall elect a president
from among its own members.
Sec. 4. And be it enacted, That said Board
of Health shall appoint a Sanitary Inspector,
and that the Town Clerk shall act as Clerk to
said Board and as registrar of vital statistics,
and they may also appoint such other officers
and assistants as said Board of Health may
deem necessary. All appointments of the said
Board of Health shall be governed by the
rules of said Board of Health, and may be
removed for cause by said Board. The police
officers of this Town shall be special Sanitary
Inspectors, and they shall promptly report to
the Board of Health every violation of the
health ordinances of this Town which may
come within their observation or knowledge.

Sec. 5. And be it enacted, That the said
Board of Health shall not contract any debts
of any kind beyond the amount of the appro-
priation first made for its use by the Town
Council.

Sec. 6. And be it enacted, That this ordi-
nance shall go into effect immediately after the
date of its final passage.

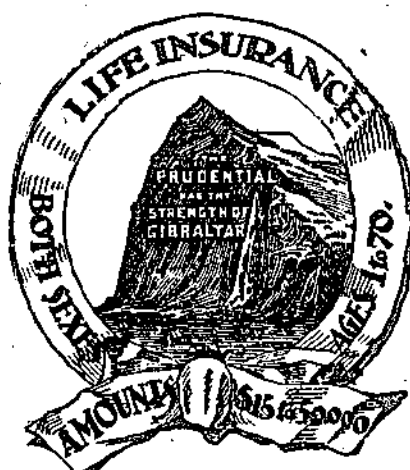

Hon. C. J. Baxter, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, will attend the Commencement exercises in Hammononton, May 19th.

Because of a new requirement in State banking laws, the Peoples Bank publish a "report of condition," this week. By comparison with the March report, one can get a fair idea of the town's financial condition.

We call the attention of newspaper correspondents to the following law of New Jersey:

"Any person who wilfully states, delivers, or transmits by any means whatever to the owner, manager, editor, publisher, or reporter of any newspaper * * * any libelous statement, untrue in fact, concerning any person or corporation, and thereby secures the actual publication of the same, is hereby declared guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment at hard labor not exceeding two years, or both."

Judge Ludlow tried one case; an attorney for the next was engaged elsewhere; other cases were not ready, and the judge closed the Supreme and Circuit Courts for the term. A few appeal cases and some criminal were left for Judge Endicott, which will probably take two or three days of next week. The Grand Jury returned twenty-two indictments, mostly trifling.
