

PARIS BY GAMBLE. — The "Paris Descriptions," by Mr. Gamble, author of "The War in France," and "Crimes of the French," has been published. It is the title of a book containing an attractive book of the day, signed by the National Publishing Company, of Philadelphia. It is a large volume of over eight hundred pages, magnificently illustrated with one hundred and fifty engravings by the best French artists, and from the pen of a writer who knows Paris well. It is a softening and interesting in high degree, besides containing a vast amount of information and anecdotes of Parisian life. The author has given a graphic and lifelike description of the darker side of Parisian life. The reader is carried into the dark and equal quarters of the King-pickers, and is introduced to the houses of prostitution, and into the scenes of gambling and debauchery. Whether the "Loyal Standard" classifies it as a good book or not, we leave to the reader to judge. The New Dominion is making active preparation to give the Pacific railroads a warm reception. Yesterday the government gold in the Treasury amounted to \$11,203,206, and the currency balance to \$10,776,131. Mr. Sumner drew attention in the Senate yesterday to the cruel treatment of cattle while in transit on the railroads. Anarchy, according to Spanish advice, prevails among the Cubans, and corporal punishment is the rule. General Butler's expenses in the suit against him in Baltimore, by Charles W. Woolley, passed the House on Saturday. Governor Senter of Tennessee, was before the Reconstruction Committee on Saturday for over an hour. He represents the condition of his State as very bad. Col. Galloway of Kentucky, who was involved in the trials of cadetships, and so lost his seat, has been defeated for re-election by the confederate General R. H. Lewis. A communication signed by several hundred residents of Wyoming Territory, heartily endorsing General Sheridan's Indian policy, has been received at general headquarters. An investigation is going on in Washington to ascertain what Congress or other members of the press have received Cuba bonds.

Chief Justice Chase has decided that the Richmond Mayorality case shall go to the Richmond Court of Appeals. The Utah bill was reported to the Senate from Committee yesterday, with "amendments" which make no material change in its provisions. Captain Hall and Dr. Mayow are both to appear before the Senate committee on Foreign Relations to-morrow in regard to the Arctic expedition. Col. Taylor's case will probably come up in the House to-day. A desperate effort will be made to induce the Democrats to vote solid for Mr. Bingham. Wyllie, ex-Auditor of Louisiana, has disappeared from New Orleans with his wife, \$600 on State warrants held to have been fraudulently issued. The bill creating aid to the Northern Pacific Railroad would have passed the Senate yesterday, by the help of an additional vote. It will undoubtedly pass when the time comes. — Governor Aspinwall was before the Reconstruction Committee of the House yesterday in regard to affairs in the South.
