From California.

Hemet, Lewis Valley, California,
April 2nd, 1909.

I received two late copies of my home paper this morning, and they were like seeing old friends.

This is a beautiful spot, named for my father, who was the first to take up a claim here. We are seventeen miles from Hemet, where we get our mail. It is between two mountains, one being covered with snow all the year, and visible from our windows. This is in the "gem belt"—fire opals, formaline, garnet, hyacinth beryl and moon stone. In the other range are gold, silver, and mica, as well as asbestos. Mountains and valleys have the most beautiful flowers and ferns, which are free to all who will pick them.

In this valley they grow grain, horses and cattle, and all have apiaries, with hundreds of swarms of bees. And such honey I never ate. They have the most luxuriant clover pastures, and produce richest milk, from which they make fine butter, richly colored. My sister does not use a churn,—just stirs the cream with a spoon, three minutes, to make rolls of lovely yellow butter. They do not feed their cows grain, but turn them into the pasture, where there is a good stream of water.

All they do to plant things is scratch the soil with a harrow, and sow. The garden is in its prime, supplying peas, radishes, cucumbers, tomatoes—sweet potatoes are doing well, too. They tell me this a backward season, being one month late;—but to me it seems two months early,—coming, as I did, from winter into summer. It seems to me like June, it is so hot in the sun: but nights are cool and lovely.

The cow herders please me, riding bareback or with saddle, throwing the lariat so dextrously as to catch anything from a dog to a steer. When they want meat they kill a calf or steer, go into the woods and shoot a deer, rabbit, quail or squirrel, they being abundant. Geraniums which are in pots at home, are hedges here, and they nail roses to the wall (not climbers), bend them at the roof, completely covering them. Houses are all one story. Arbutus they grow on a screen on the shady side of the house, some reaching the eaves. In fact, all kinds of flowers grow wild here. Calla lilies look like fields of snow, at a distance. Oranges, grape fruit, lemons, olives, grapes, apples, all kinds of fruits and nuts are at their best in this perpetual summer.

There is no fence in this county, the people having seen the folly of it. Birds are nesting on every hand, and such beautiful plumage, and so tame they build on the porches, like human company.

I shall keep a wagon on the street in Elkins, selling my products,—what I raise and what I take in trade.

My health is greatly improved. I have gained about thirty pounds, and feel much better; but I am afraid to enter the ministry yet, and can make no plans as to that.

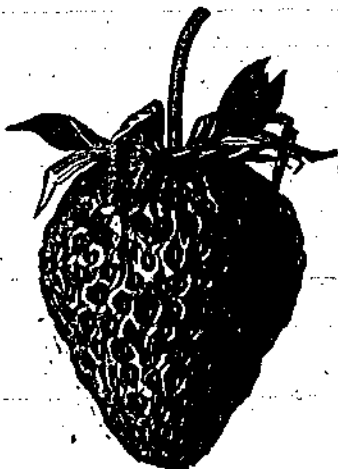
