OBITUARY.

Capt. A. D. Dent sailed from New Bedford the first day of May, 1894, for a thirty months' cruise in the South Atlantic, expecting to take in both the sperm and right whaling, and also to look after other interests at sea. In January he was stricken down with pneumonia from which he rallied and went on duty too soon, causing his illness to be complicated with pleurisy; he gradually grew worse, and on February 18th he died, at sea. A letter was that day written to his people here in Hammonton, and is supposed to have been sent by a passing steamer and mailed at Barbados, reaching Hammonton April 2nd. Mrs. Dent was expecting to go the next trip with her husband, if he did not conclude best to settle down again in the little "Garden of Eden" as he usually expressed it when speaking of Hammonton.

The Capt. had followed the water over twenty years before he married, and this was his first trip since. He was for several years master of the barque "Alice Knowles," on the Arctic Ocean, sailing from San Francisco. In November, 1890, on returning from his last voyage from the Arctic, being then in poor health, he was obliged to travel by easy stages and stop at several towns a day or two for rest. Dec. 29th '90 he was married, in Malden, Mass., at the lovely home of intimate friends, Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Adams, at their request. They then came here on a short tour, stopping in N. Y. City, Boston, New Bedford and other places in New Hampshire and Massachusetts, finally returning to Malden. In the Spring Mrs. D. persuaded him to return to Hammonton and here his health improved rapidly. After entirely recovering he went to Philadelphia and bought a grocery and provision store, making their home there a year, then sold out and again returned to Hammonton. He concluded to settle here, so started a tea and coffee store in the Fay building, which shortly after burned to the ground. Having many good offers to go to sea again, his ambition became too great to remain on land, and he was persuaded to go.

Capt. D. was a native of Illinois, his parents both Southern people, natives of Kentucky; both died when he was quite a young man. There were three other children, a brother and two sisters; the brother and one sister died, the remaining sister at last accounts was living in Japan.

Since the death of his parents the Captain made his home in New Bedford when in port, up to the time of his marriage. He was very fond of society, and was in the habit of giving large parties each time he made port in New Bedford. He was very attractive in his manner, a gentleman bred and born; his countenance pleasing and winning. He was gentle and refined in all his movements, and idolized his wife and home as few men do, and was like a ray of sunshine whenever he entered the house. The only fault he could be accused of was too much confidence in others. His loss will be sadly felt in nearly all parts of the world as he had friends with all nations, colors and creed. Although he has gone to a bright and more beautiful world, and we can never see his smiling face here again, or hear his pleasant voice among us, his memory still lives with us and can never be forgotten. He was a charter member of the Order of Red Men in New Bedford, and it was his intention to unite with the Masonic fraternity on his return from this voyage.

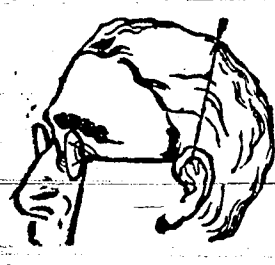

A town ordinance, still in force,
forbids bicycle riding on sidewalks any-
where in town. A later ordinance for-
bids riding faster than eight miles an
hour on Bellevue Avenue and Twelfth
Street to Grand Street, and on inter-
secting streets within a quarter of a
mile of Bellevue; also requires an alarm
bell on each machine and a lighted lamp
on each after dusk. At its last meeting,
Council instructed the Marshal to en-
force the sidewalk ordinance within
the same limits as the speed ordinance
names; but riders are still liable to fine
for riding on sidewalks anywhere in
town, if any one cares to make com-
plaint.

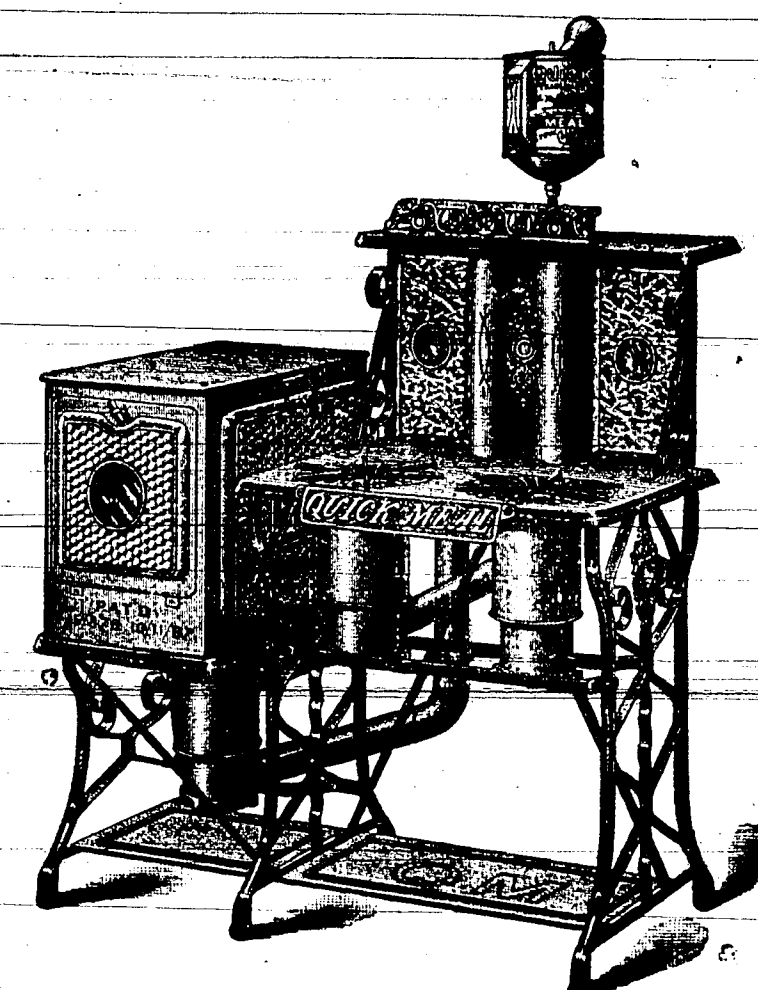

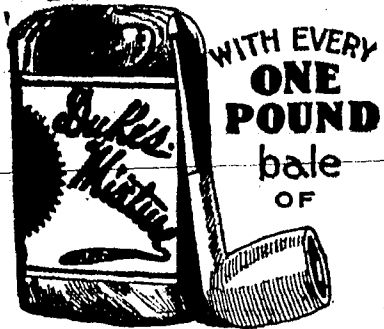

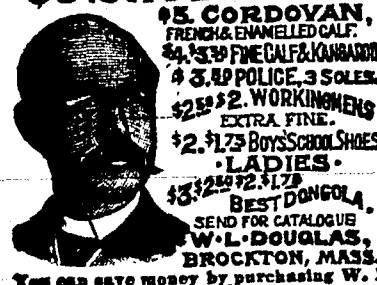
