

The State Board of Education on Monday last apportioned to the several countles of the state the amount each will receive out of the money to be raised through the state school tax. This money represents the five dellars for each child of school age, and aggregates—la—rouud—aambers—\$2,250,000;-The money is apportioned to the con ties on a basis of their retables, with the exception that a small amount is taken from two or three of the larger counties to assist two or three of the rural counties, where the ratables are not so high in proportion to the number of ebildren.

This apportionment will also form the borin of the distribution of the \$813 000 appropriated from the State treasury to aid in reducing the state school tax. This appropriation will provide 85 per cent of the above tax, being equivalent to a reduction in the tax rate of 10 10 ou each \$100,





The pen at the extreme left is designed to record, electrically, the velocity of the wind. For this purpose .s small anemometer is fixed to the kitt | and connected to the instrument by wires. The pen makes little marks or the record sheet corresponding to every two miles of wind movement. The Weather, Bureau kites attain an altitude of a mile and a half in some cases, and frequently reach 7,000 feet in beight,

When flying at an elevation of from 5. 000 to 7,000 feet one of the Weather Bureau kites, supporting its instrument, will pull from 60 to 80 pounds, if not more, and from 8,000 to 10,000 feet




